THE CITY LIGHTING.

A most extraordinary condition of things has followed the amalgamation of the city lighting companies into one, the salient features of which are that while the rates for lighting have been raised the service is more unsatisfactory than ever before. The Guardian was wont to complain in the old days of dim lights and an irregular and intermittent service. The lights are still dim and intermittent in street and home, but the periods of darkness are longer than before.

The householder has usually to wait till long after darkness has set in before the electric light is available and he knows not the moment when his home will be left in darkness, it may be for five minutes, or for hours or for the balance of the night. In the churches from time to time the lights go out during the hours of worship. Again and again this has occurred. As for the streets the writer has grown accustomed to find Great George Street in total darkness when wending his way homeward at any hour from ten o'clock in the evening to two o'clock in the morning. A period of residence in each of four or five different Canadian cities compels the statement that our city lighting is by far the worst of which we have any knowledge or experience.

Night after night passengers arrive by boat or train, some of them strangers, visiting our city for the first time, and they find the streets in total darkness, and perchance on reaching a hotel or the home of a friend they find the place dimly illuminated by an oil lamp or a candle. All this while the City is paying to have our streets and squares lighted and citizens are paying advanced rates for lights in their homes during full time and without rebate for the frequent and prolonged periods in which they have no light. And when the lights are out, from whatever cause, it is all in vain to telephone to the office of the Light Company. No answer need be expected, if indeed "Central" does not tell the inquirer, that it is quite useless to connect with the Light Company at all. Our people are patient to a fault but patience is worn out in this matter.

The reputation of the City suffers, tourist travel is driven away and our visitors inquire what manner of people we are that we put up with such conditions. And yet so far as we have noticed the management of the Light Company have not thought it worth while to make any explanation or apology to the public through the usual channels. We are left to guess how long the present nightly darkness will prevail; whether it is to go on through the coming Exhibition, or whether it is to be continued indefinitely. And yet one would think some explanation or excuse would be offered if only to relieve the management from the implication of incompetence or a wilful disregard of the feelings and convenience of the public.

SENATOR GILLMOR ILL.

St. Andrews, N. B., Sept. 1—(Special)—Hon. A. H. Gillmor is quite seriously ill at his residence, St. George. Today his condition was slightly improved.

Fifty years ago Japan was almost an unknown nation and neither her statesmen nor her people knew anything of western civilization. And yet she elected her Parliament by secret ballot a few weeks ago. In swift succession this wonderful people has adopted our system of representative Government, perfected an army and a navy on modern lines, has introduced railways, telegraphs, telephones and electric lights, has built factories and equipped them with the most up-to-date machinery, and now stands ready to adopt any new or useful invention or discovery which the western nations can bring forth. And these alert Japs are our next neighbors to the westward across the Pacific ocean. We shall have need to keep moving in Canada.

Premier Seddon of New Zealand was opposed to woman suffrage when that measure was adopted there, but when recently interviewed on the subject he spoke very highly of the working of the system in his country. "I have been," he said, "a representative in New Zealand as far back as I can remember and I am now and have been since 1870. 'Father of the House.' They always had high moral tone and any man putting up for Parliament as to whose moral character there was the slightest doubt, might just as well save his time and money." Mr. Seddon also stated that the women voters in New Zealand contented themselves with voting. They never aspired to office, nor had any of them expressed any wish to enter Parliament. Their rule of conduct seemed to be that it was better to work outside where their efforts would be more effective.

OTTAWA REVENUE RETURNS.

OTTAWA, Sept. 1.—The customs revenues for the month of August was \$3,326,450, an increase of \$226,970 over the same period last year. The revenue for the two months of the fiscal year is \$5,929,537, an increase of \$650,134 over the same time last year.

CANADIAN COLONY DINES SIR WILFRID.

PARIS, Sept. 1.—The Canadian Colony of Paris tonight banqueted Sir Wilfrid Laurier. M. Ribot, a former French premier, presided. The 200 guests included Lady Laurier, Hon. W. S. Fielding and prominent French statesmen.
