—After an illness of more than a year, the death of Mrs. George MacLeod occurred at her home at Irishtown on Sunday, April 4th, 1948. She was formerly Hannah Bernard, and was born in Baltic in 1859, but had lived at Irishtown since her marriage 63 years ago to Mr. George MacLeod who survives her.

She is lovingly remembered by family and friends, and those who were her neighbors, before the infirmities of age overcame her, will not soon forget her many acts of kindness in the time of need.

Of a large family of brothers and sisters, only one sister survives, Mrs. M. A. Evans, New Westminster, B. C.

Besides the bereaved husband, two sons, James B. in the home and Kenneth of Irishtown are left to mourn, also seven grand-children, Evelyn (Mrs. Charles Adams), John E., Enid, Louise, and Elda, George T. and Blanche MacLeod, and six great grand-children. Cooke Acquitted In Libel Case

(By The Canadian Press) EDMONTON, April 9—Dapper Jack Kent Cooke, who achieved distinction in the local press by wearing a different suit every day of his trial, today stepped from the box a free man, acquitted of "counselling the publication of a defamatory libel."

However, Mr. Justice J. Boyd McBride's finding after the five-day trial arising from the Dec. 17 issue of New Liberty magazine may not be final. Crown Prosecutor C. S. Blanchard said the Attorney General's Department would announce Monday whether it would revive another charge against Mr. Cooke, publisher of the magazine, who earlier also had been accused with Dr. Charlotte Whitton and writer Harold Dingsman with conspiring to commit libel.

Danish Prince Denies Engagement Rumors

LONDON, April 9—(AP)—Prince George of Denmark threw cold water today on gossip that his engagement to Princess Margaret will be announced later this year. "I wish these rumors would stop," he said. "There is not a bit of truth in them."

Buckingham Palace was bound by a rule that no notice be taken of rumors about the Royal Family. Informally, however, palace officials expressed disbelief. The Prince, 27, is a military attaché at the Danish Embassy here. Princess Margaret, younger daughter of the King and Queen, will be 18 in August.
