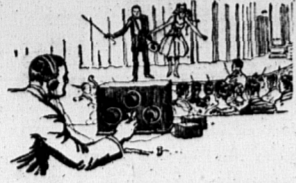

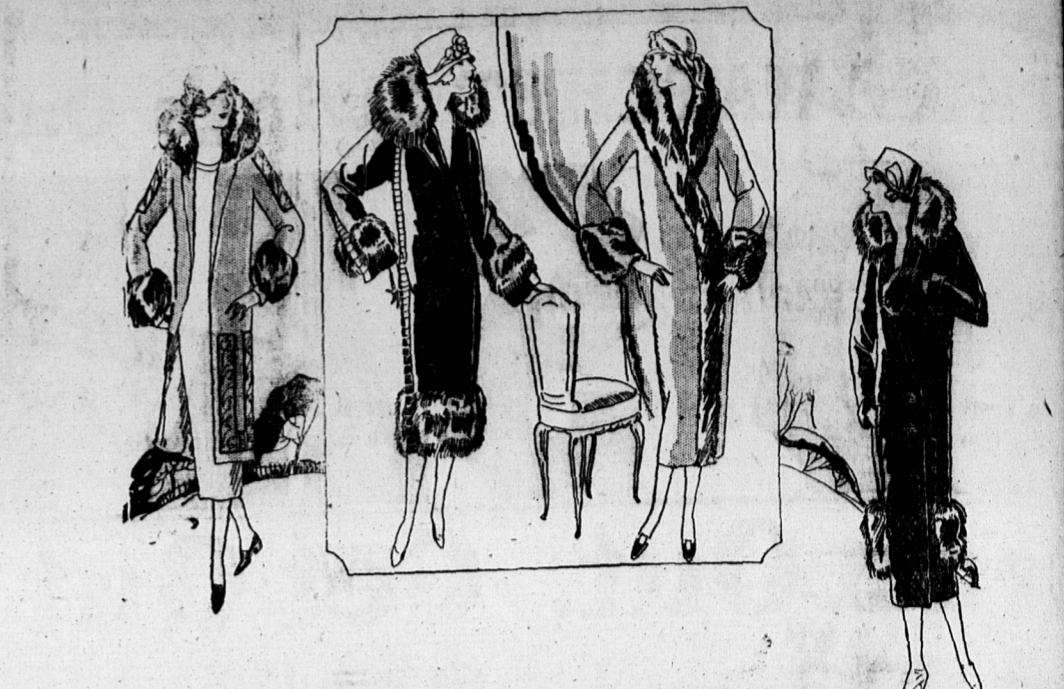

### Radio Fill a Long Felt Want

(Special to The Guardian.)  
MONTREAL, Dec. 6.—Another evidence of the growing usefulness of radio is given through the announcement that station C.N.R.A. at Moncton is now providing each week a special news service for the benefit of the rural population. This broadcast has been rendered possible through the co-operation of W. H. Swift, Jr., radio engineer of the Canadian National Railways and P. E. Light, chief of the markets intelligence service at Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. The news broadcast is for the benefit of the Maritime Provinces generally. The new station at Moncton serves a wide territory. Indeed, its usefulness in that direction may be gauged by the fact that it has been heard several times in England and Scotland.

The Maritime Provinces are somewhat isolated as regards marketing facilities and therefore depend almost entirely on the other provinces and the export markets for their agricultural and other products. Other provinces are better served as regards markets and general agricultural news, and the service now inaugurated is intended to provide the Maritimes with a useful and timely news service on outside markets and market opportunities. It has been estimated that 63 per cent. of the population of the Maritime Provinces is rural, and that fact indicated to those responsible for the program of Moncton station the necessity of furnishing material of direct interest to such a large section of the community. It has been predicted that the day is coming when radio receiving sets will be more common on farms than telephones or Ford cars, and that great good can be achieved by increased communication between the department of agriculture and the farmers by means of the radio broadcasting.

The Canadian National Railways' radio department had previously inaugurated similar services for farmers through the powerful broadcasting stations at Ottawa and Winnipeg. Through these stations the latest information on markets and conditions are being given out, and officials of the department of agriculture give frequent addresses on topics of particular interest to farmers. Plans are now under consideration for an even greater enlargement of this service so as to bring to every section of the country the special information required by its rural population.
