Liquor Exporters Have Troubles of Their Own

After further questions Att. General Johnston asked: "Do you keep any invoices of liquor shipments here?" "Not since January."

"Well, we only kept those for the mail orders from New Brunswick, so that we could file any claims. The shipping to New Brunswick ceased on the 18th of January, when they took the plebsite."

"It went dry?" "Yes. Invoice books kept by the company up to Jan. 15 were produced and identified. Witness explained that the rum cost 58 cents a gallon at port of shipment. On the two puncheons on which duty had been paid the price worked out at about \$16.45 a gallon. Witness had no acquaintance with any of the prisoners."

Mr. Inman: "You say you do not know anything about the taking of the liquor?" "Witness: "No." "You didn't see it taken or know the parties who took it?" "Absolutely not."

And you come on the stand and give evidence about something you know nothing about?" "I am giving evidence to the questions you are asking me." "Were you subpoenaed here?" "No."

Att. General Johnston: "When did you book passages for your wife and children at Montreal?" "I booked them in St. John on the 24th of April. They left on June 10th."

Alex. Lafferty, employee of the freight shed, (sworn) identified receipt of liquor taken by truckman Gallant from the freight shed; Gallant took only two deliveries of one puncheon each. The other eight puncheons were taken by Mr. Fraser of the Customs department. The one receipt was made on the 24th of April. Three deliveries though only Gallant's name appeared on it.

Jos. Gallant, truckman, the next witness called, testified to having hauled a puncheon of rum on two occasions recently from the freight shed to the Canadian Distributing Company's warehouse, Water St. (Cross-examined by Mr. Shaw.) He had hauled liquor previously for this company to the cold storage, and for the Charlottetown Export Company. He often hauled early in the morning, sometimes before daylight, to catch the early train. We would not think it unusual in his business for a man to come to his house early in the morning and asked him to move a couple of barrels. He knew the prisoner Edward Hennessey. He was a good honest fellow."

Normand Bazinet, assistant manager of Charlottetown branch, Canadian Distributing Company (sworn), repeated his testimony given at preliminary trial. The two puncheons of rum taken by the company from the station are still in the warehouse, where any body can see them.

Witness did not know where the customs department stored the other liquor. He knew they moved it from the station, and he saw two or three puncheons going up on a jigger which Mr. Fraser told him afterwards was the Distributing Company's rum. He did not

know prisoners to speak to, nor had he at any time any transactions with them.

The Court: "How many puncheons did you say you saw on the jigger?"

"Two, or three, I didn't notice particularly."

"Might there have been four?" "I don't think the jigger would take that many."

"How much did each of the puncheons weigh?" "About twelve hundred pounds."

"You can't swear positively that this stuff was saw passing in the puncheons with Mr. Fraser belonging to you, or that it was liquor at all or not?"

"No."

(Cross-examined by Mr. Inman.) Witness had been about 2 years with the Distributing Company.

He had been in Charlottetown since the 20th of last December, having come from St. John, and indirectly, from Montreal and Quebec.

Mr. Inman: "Are those two puncheons of rum still unopened in your warehouse?" "They might have been opened."

"Do you know whether they are open?" "They are generally opened in the warehouse."

"Are they open or not?" "They are open."

"Were they open at the time of the trial in the Magistrate's Court?" "Yes, they were open then."

"You saw two of the other puncheons passing with Fraser on the jigger. How did you know it was yours?"

"Mr. Fraser told me afterwards it was our liquor."

"Did you know that any Liquors were coming in about the 1st of June in connection with your business?"

"Yes."

"Do you know that provision was made in the new law for storing your stuff in government warehouses?"

"I knew nothing about bonded warehouses."

"Do you know there is not such a thing in Canada as bonded warehouses; that the stuff down at the station was in bond and that cheems out?"

"Yes."

"Did you know when the liquor was being moved away that it was not being moved to your place?"

"Yes, I knew it didn't go to our place."

"You knew the liquor was in bond?"

"Yes."

"Did you ask Mr. Fraser if it was moving into a bonded warehouse?"

"No."

"Did you spend the evening with Mr. Hand?"

"Yes, I drove in a car with him from about 8.45 till 11 p. m., and that till about midnight."

"Did you mention to Mr. Hand anything about the rum being moved?"

"No, we never had any talk about that."

"Did Mr. Hand mention anything to you about his seeing the rum moved?"

"No."

"When Mr. Fraser told you he had moved the rum did you not think it worth while to ask where they had taken it, or to inform your superior officer that it was moved?"

"No."

"But as soon as you read in the paper that the two puncheons were gone you thought fit to wire Mr. Hand?"

"I did then, yes."

"How long after?" "I sent the first telegram about 10 or 11 o'clock at night. I could not get him in Montreal before that."

"You knew he was going away?" "Yes."

"Had he any business besides seeing his wife and family off for England?"

"Not that I know of."

"Is there any code between you and the St. John office?" "No."

"Had you any correspondence with the St. John office from the time Mr. Hand went away until he came back?"

"No."

"Would the going away of Mr. Hand interrupt the business between you and the St. John office?"

"There was no business done."

"Did you ever communicate with Mr. Hand elsewhere in Canada other than when he was in St. John or on his last visit to Montreal?"
