LONDON, April 27.—Third-class sleeping accommodation at probable charges of from 5 shillings to 7 shillings 6 pence, is expected to be provided on long-distance trains between London and the North and West this summer. "No decision on the charges has yet been made," said an official of the Railway Companies' Association to a reporter, "but the estimate of 5s. to 7s. 6d. will be near the mark. The conversion of the coaches will take some time, and the first routes on which they will be utilized will probably be from London to the north to Liverpool, to Holyhead, to Fishguard, and perhaps to Plymouth."
