Dr. McLeod Discusses Health & Rehabilitation

Following are excerpts from an address on "Health and Rehabilitation" delivered last night to the P. E. I. Registered Nurses Association by Dr. K. E. MacLeod.

"Prevention of disease is the best means whereby we may win the battle for health. But prevention is no longer a purely personal matter of self-discipline although it is ever was. It is as important as it ever was. It has become, and is becoming more so, each day that passes, a communal concern of the first order. It is for this reason, that every responsible government has among its chief ministries, a Department of Health under the jurisdiction of a Minister of Health. It is for this reason also, that every city, town and county in enlightened countries, maintain often a very complete health and sanitary department, under the guidance of at least one medical officer of health.

"Measures, such as diphtheria immunization, smallpox vaccination and in many countries, vaccination against the scourge of tuberculosis carried out with the utmost care and conscientiousness, have become, in the order of the day, in the fight against the death-dealing diseases these measures are designed to combat. And it is for this reason also that responsible government, everywhere, are paying such attention to such important considerations as the promotion of the health and well-being of the people, as schemes for maternal and child welfare. It is all part and parcel of man's endeavours to ward off disease and retain health.

"We may not agree with the methods of the government in Great Britain of the day, in its policy to carry out its program for health, but we, all of us agree I think, with the principle involved therein. We read in recent newspapers that in Britain, responsible authority have gone so far as to state, and legislate because they believe that the science of nutrition is so complex a matter that no longer may the individual housewife be allowed to choose the meals for the family at random. No! These must be planned by state experts, who will make it their duty to it that each child, and adult, gets his or her exact quota of calories, of proteins, carbohydrates and fats, and also of vitamins.

"We read also this very day, that the British Royal Commission on Population have gone so far as to suggest that birth control and family policy, should be guided by a planned parenthood supplemented by expert advice on contraception. That life should be planned to such a degree, that the individual, guided in such a manner will cause revolt in many minds. . . and I personally would hate to see our society guided to such a degree, by such a government, but even in our fair Province of Prince Edward Island you have on the statute book an Act, whereby no person may get married without a certificate of a clean bill of health.

Reason and Discretion

"In other words, your Government have thought it right and proper that a measure of this kind should be enacted. It only remains to suggest that birth control, and discretion, and by also remembering the proprieties, and above all, religious and other considerations, to arrive at a happy medium, whereby the desirable ends are attained without too many risksome, unpleasant, and distasteful results being imposed. Live and let live, and let us have reason, and discretion, in all such matters. Here is the essence of true democracy. This new way of the British Government, to try to control human beings, in all such matters, as such is inhuman, and being inhuman therefore unkind, and such should be eschewed by all decent human beings. . . for it is perhaps, after all a pleasant thing, with all the many faults of such, to be an ordinary, rather unambitious, and incomplete human being, than to be the shining chrome screw in some vast state conception, no matter how perfect. H. G. Wells in his book "Things to Come" tried to depict when all that would end. So also did Huxley in one of his books.

"There are many faults of modern society, which can and should be corrected. For example, how many parents realize the great importance to health, of adequate and regular hours of sleep for their young growing children? Far too many children of tender years are out of their beds until the very late hours—to their detriment. Television, as a pastime, is often chosen. . . for, how many of their parents give a moment's thought to the fact, that so many of these children, are being allowed to read in books and papers, to listen on the radio, and to see in the cinema, much of what is definitely harmful to the young growing mind? Discipline in the home, of both parent, and child, is in many instances not what it was in the days of grandparents, and in consequence, there is little wonder at the great growth throughout the world, of a mean and terrifying degree of child delinquency.

No luxuries he could give your children would atone to them for having a mother living a life of shame, or for their being reared up in such a household and in such an atmosphere. And, at its best, you will be sacrificing a whole lifetime of decency and the respect of others for a few years of soft living, for men of the caliber of this man soon tire of their lady's loves and throw them aside as carelessly as they would an old glove.
