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## HA WKS, WOLVES CONTINUE WINNING WAYS

### Wolverines Hand Abegweits Second Straight Setback

#### Third Period Goal By Nicholson Averts Shutout As Halifax Team Wins 6-1.

HALIFAX, Nov. 22—Constantly battering their way through the enemy's loose defence, Halifax Wolverines swung into their old style of speed attacks to defeat Charlottetown Abegweits 6-1 here tonight. It was the second straight victory for the Wolves since the opening of the Maritime Hockey League season.

Unable to penetrate the Halifax rear-guard, Abbies confined their early efforts to distant sniping but their firing was not dangerous and Sargent found little trouble in turning the shots away from his cage. With Wolves blanking them by five straight shots Charlotte-town made a desperate last-minute attempt to prevent a shut-out and they accomplished it when Nicholson banged a speeding backhand shot from the blueline just a couple of minutes after the third period opening.

From then it was a fast, rugged game that saw no fewer than eight penalties in the closing moments. But Abbies could not regain their lost ground and Mosher lengthened the Halifax margin with another tally, to make it the even half dozen.

Wolves were strengthened by the long-awaited appearance of Paul Gagnon, the speedy French-Canadian from the Montreal City League who received sanction for his transfer only 15 minutes before the opening. He went in to replace Captain Vince Ferguson on the left wing but was chased by Butler almost immediately for rough tactics which twice more put him in the penalty box.

Abbies, noted for their open playing style, were languid at the start and seldom attempted to break through to the Halifax goal. Instead, they fired at long distance whenever they had an opportunity. The aggressive Wolves, however, gave them few of these chances and kept them busy defending their easy openings.

The first goal of the night came from the stick of the hard-fighting Shields in the midst of a scramble in front of the Abbies goal after five minutes of slow hockey. After that the game was fast with the

Wolves making united sallies on the Charlottetown citadel. The defence of the Wolverines proved impregnable in this period, and the long shots of the enemy forwards were ineffective.

The best goal came from cocky Frankie Lavigne's stick when he made a lone sally down the ice, shot to the side, rushed in on the rebound, and mercilessly shot the puck past helpless McCann.

The middle session produced dazzling hockey which saw the Wolverines score no less than three goals, while the Abbies breaking through on many occasions, could not get away effective shots.

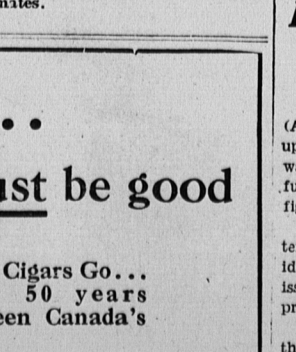
Both goalies were making brilliant saves in the last period, while forwards crawled over their bodies in attempts to slide the rubber over the line.

The Abbies saved themselves from a shutout when Nicholson slid a tricky backhand shot past Sargent from the blue line. Eight penalties were handed out by Referee Butler, but four Wolverines failed to capitalize against three of the Abbies at one time.

The last goal was scored by Mosher who got away his shot while falling from a heavy body check, the game ending 6-1.

### TO INTERPRET RULES FOR MAR. REFEREES

AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 22—Referees in Maritime hockey will be given official instructions early in December by "an official from Montreal," James E. Wry, President of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association, announced here tonight. The instructions, to advise referees of "the uniform interpretation of hockey rules of the M. A. H. A.," will be given at meetings to be held at three central points in the Maritimes, the President said.

The matter has been under consideration for several weeks, said Mr. Wry, but "we had no intention of bringing a man down here for the sole benefit of the Maritime Hockey Association. However, we felt obliged to wait until such time as the natural ice clubs were organized and proposed to start their seasons."

The Premier after congratulating the Hawks on behalf of the Province on their winning of the Allan Cup will face-off the puck to send the teams into action.

Fans in attendance at the game will have an opportunity of glimpsing the famed "Allan Cup" as the Hawks are planning on taking the treasured piece of silverware along with them on their first visit of the 1933-34 season.

Sammy McManus and Knucker Irvine are the leading scorers in the M. H. L., both players having four points, three goals and one assist.

"Hickey" Nicholson's goal last night, while averting a shutout, also was the means of a new hat for the Charlottetown boy, said Chapman being donated by Kelly & McNis to the Abegweit scoring the first goal for his team.

### Allan Cup Holders Hand Saint John Team 7-0 Shutout

#### Two Lucky Goals In First Period Start Hawks On Way To One-sided Victory.

MONCTON, Nov. 22—The Moncton Hawks routed the Saint John Beavers 7-0 in the second engagement of the "Big Four" League here tonight before a mediocre crowd of fans who saw little to get enthused over except the occasional flashes of the Hawks in their goal scoring surges on the Beavers' cage. The result of tonight's game left the Beavers sharing the cellar position with the Charlottetown Abegweits who lost to Halifax, and gave the Hawks and Wolverines a joint lead on the top rung.

Goalie Charlie Wilson turned in a good and at times sensational game for the Beavers but he was the victim of two tough breaks in the first period that gave the Nicklin crew a 2-goal lead.

Thirty-eight seconds after the first face-off "Knucker" Irvine raced to the Saint John blue-line and lifted a rainbow shot in front of Wilson. The puck struck the ice in front of the cage and bounded over his stick into the net. Four minutes later the speeding Irvine fired a high shot from the blue-line which struck the netting behind the Beavers' goal, rebounded and struck Wilson in the back and trickled down into the cage.

The period was just about half gone when the Hawks trapped the Moncton blue-line. Bill Gill broke quickly, flanked by Miller and Webster. Gill carried to the blue-line and sent a long pass to Webster who drew the defence before returning the pass. Gill was parked right on Wilson's doorstep when he received the puck and gave the goals no chance to save.

The Allan Cup holders scored two more goals in the second. The first by Connolly who raced into Saint John territory alone and rifled a wing shot past Wilson into the upper corner of the net, and near the close of the period Irvine jammed Duke McDonald's rebound

between Wilson's feet before the goalie could clear.  
Bill Miller scored the sixth Moncton goal on the prettiest individual play of the evening, hurdling a mass of sticks to get in close to Wilson before picking up the unprotected corner of the net. A minute later McManus scooped up Webster's rebound from the boards and slammed it past Wilson.  
The Beavers fought like trojans in the latter stages of the game and opened several good scoring chances while Bill Gill was serving penalties, but weakness around the Moncton cage, plus Jimmy Foster's sensational net-minding stayed off the thrusters.

**Veteran Philadelphian Will Draw UP PLANS FOR LEAGUE**

NEW YORK, Nov. 22—The master boxer of the big fellows, canny old Tommy Loughran of Philadelphia, added another gem to his long victory string tonight as he outpointed Ray Impellittere, new-entrant of the ring, after a fidgety referee had almost waved him out of the arena with a technical knockout defeat in the sixth round.

New York rings have not seen in years the sight to which a crowd of 6,000 was treated in the big barn of the Coliseum, far up in the Bronx, as Loughran, in complete command up to the sixth round, suddenly ran into a right uppercut that tore a deep gash in the left corner of his mouth.

Tommy staggered back as blood poured from the wound and streamed down his chest. Instantly Referee Pete Hartley, once a good welterweight, stepped in, peered at the wound and lifted his arms like a football official signalling a touchdown.

Only this time he meant that the gallant old timer had been stopped by the 255-pound giant who was waging his first major battle. Impellittere, only 24 years old but six feet 7 1/2 inches tall and a perfectly schooled boxer, promptly went to his corner and sat down as the crowd howled hysterically. Hartley mopped his face with his handkerchief, and General John J. Phelan, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission, fought his way to the ringside. Loughran saw him coming and desisted in his efforts to get at Impellittere on his stool. He raced to the ropes and yelled his pleas to the commissioner.

Ordered Bout Continued  
Phelan was in complete accord. As soon as he could lift his voice high enough above the clamor to reach Hartley's ears, he ordered the bout continued. Hartley summoned Impellittere from his chair as the giant's managers protested bitterly.

### U.S. ATHLETES RECONSIDER

Take Milder View As Jewish Participation In Olympic Games Is Sought.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—(A.P.)—The United States Olympic Association, composed of every major amateur sports governing body of the country, today held out the olive branch to Germany on the question of Jewish participation in sports and in the Olympic games of 1936 at Berlin.

A resolution tempering the stand taken by the Amateur Athletic Union at its Pittsburgh Convention was unanimously adopted. It expressed the hope that full freedom of participation would be extended German athletes of Jewish faith and promised United States participation if that were done.

As it convened in quadrennial session it appeared likely the Association would follow the stand taken by the A. A. U., its major member, and declared for United States withdrawal from the 1936 games unless the German Government "in fact as well as in theory" abided by the olympic principle of non-discrimination against any race, color or religion.

Such a resolution was offered. But after listening to an address by Brigadier General Charles H. Sherrill, United States member of the International Olympic Committee, in which he warned such action would do more harm than good, not only in Germany but in the United States as well, the more temperate course was taken by the convention.

One factor influencing the action was the cablegram yesterday from Dr. Theodore Lewald, himself of Jewish descent, and the other two German members of the International Committee, declaring the pledge given the committee at Vienna in June was being adhered to and "that since Vienna neither Government nor Olympic Committee issued any decree or order discriminating against German Jewish athletes."

**KUHN STARTS BISON ON WAY TO WIN**

The locals scored the only goal in the first, but six minutes after the start of the second period, Kuhn swooped in from the right side and tallied Buffalo's first on an unassisted attempt. Jarvis and Hollett chalked up two more before the end of the session. Teasdale ended the scoring with an unassisted goal in the third period.
