POOR LOBSTER SEASON IN C. B.

LOUISBURG, August 2.—After a very unsuccessful and unprofitable season the Cape Breton fishermen ceased their fishery here on Thursday, and although being able to operate up until the first of August the scarcity of lobsters and heavily increasing expenses led them to wind up the season's operations much earlier than they otherwise would have done were it not for the fact that the fishermen never got properly over the loss of so much of their gear in the storm of July eight, which had the effect of putting some of them out of business.
