RAILWAY EMPLOYEES

The number of employees on Canadian railways was cut from 174,485 for 1930 to 154,569 for 1931 or 11.4 per cent and the pay roll was reduced from \$268,347,374 to \$229,499,505 or by 14.5 per cent. The average annual salary for employees on hourly rates was \$1,412 as against \$1,471 in 1930 and for employees on daily or monthly rates it was \$3,774 as against \$1,815 in 1930. A flat rate of 10 per cent in basic rates became effective December 1, 1931 for engineers, trainmen and telegraphers and for other classes of employees during the spring of 1932. The above averages are per position and not per man.

British Palaces Past and Present

LONDON, Oct. 6.—Visitors to London who have been struck by the modern appearance of Buckingham Palace probably do not realize, in most cases, that the palace is, indeed, just what it looks to be: the most recent, occupied of the London royal domiciles.

Buckingham Palace has been the regular abode of the Sovereign for only about a hundred years, Queen Victoria having chosen it as her sole London home in preference to all other palaces. Before her time various other residences were favored by particular monarchs. Some of these have been entirely swept away, while others survive only in part.

Of the other royal palaces, Hampton Court, Kensington and St. James' are still occupied. The last named is still the "official" residence of the Sovereign, and even now ambassadors are accredited to "the Court of St. James'."

Four members of the King's family have residences at Kensington Palace. They are Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll, Princess Beatrice, Princess Alice and the Earl of Athlone, and the Dowager Marchioness of Milford Haven. Kensington was the birthplace of both Queen Victoria and the present Queen.

At Hampton Court, there are fifty four sets of inhabited apartments, and fifteen in all at Kensington. Five of the former and four of the latter are occupied by officials; the others are called "Grace and Favor" residences. The official residences are repaired and decorated throughout by the office of works, but the others, having once been decorated for each occupant, must be kept in order by them.

Of the palaces which have partly or wholly disappeared, even Englishmen remember little. Who, for example, recalls that Kensington was once the "King's Town" and that the Anglo Saxon rulers had their palaces there? All trace of the building has disappeared, though the Royal Duchy of Cornwall still owns property on its site.

Almost all that remains to recall the Palace of Bridewell, near Fleet Street, where Henry VIII lived with Katherine of Aragon, is St. Bride's Well, which is now a pump.

Westminster Hall, one of present day London glories is part of the royal palace that stood for many centuries on the site of the modern Houses of Parliament.

The fact is frequently forgotten that the Tower of London was for many years not only a fortress and a prison but a palace as well. Though the "King's Apartments" and the "Queen's Lodgings" no longer exist, the present weapon room was long the banquetting hall and the Norman chapel of St. John was the private oratory of English sovereigns until Tudor times.

Winter Clothes Look Like Spring

PARIS, Oct. 6.—A lot of the new winter clothes look like spring models, so light weight in appearance and unburdened by fur. This, however, means that the designers of Paris styles, and the manufacturers of French fabrics have discovered that it is no longer necessary to have that heavy and weighted down look in order to be warm. The new winter woolen fabrics are as light as a feather and as warm as an elderdown comfort.
