The potato famine has been relieved somewhat by the arrival of the schooner E. L. HARRARD, Charlottetown, registered at the Halifax Hotel, Halifax, yesterday.

At the Liberal Convention held yesterday at Brantford, John S. Cousins, of Park Corner, was nominated as the candidate for the first district of Queen's in the Provincial Legislature.

THERE was a brisk market yesterday, a good deal of country produce being in evidence. The roads at the present time between mud and frost are in a terrible condition, otherwise there would have been a record attendance.

In the senate on Monday Senator Ferguson gave notice of a motion to discuss the development of the Hudson Bay route, and the need for life saving stations on the Pacific and North shore of Prince Edward Island.

So many people were delighted with the recent concert given by Miss Crawford and Miss Hyde in this city, the board of directors of Y.M.C.A. have secured these talented artists to give another concert at the Opera House Tuesday December 11th. Some time ago the skipper arrived here with a large cargo of produce from Souris, P. E. I., on his way to St. Jacques. Meeting the gale his vessel sprang a leak, and he was compelled to dispose of a large quantity of potatoes in order to lighten the craft when she underwent repairs on the marine railway. The money obtained for the tubers was the money secured by the captain's friends last night, and it is not quite likely it will ever go back to its owner.

I., with 220 bush. potatoes, 50 bush. turnips, 2 bush. parsnips, and 3 hogs; Iona from Chester, with 130 doz. cabbage, 35 half bbls. krait, 4 bbls. beets; Togo from Tanook, with 180 dozen cabbage, 40 half bbls. krait; schooner Poland, from Vernon River Bridge, P. E. I., with 1405 bush. oats, 2221 bush. potatoes, 500 bush. turnips, 30 bush. carrots, 4 bush. parsnips, 1 1/2 tons hay, 4 pigs.
