FOUNDER OF CARRIER PIGEON SERVICE DEAD

(Canadian Press) LONDON, June 21-Lieut-Colonel Alfred Henry Osman, the man who founded a "winged" secret service of pigeons during the war, is dead, aged 68. Thousands of messages from ships at sea, from secret service and their agents in hiding, from one headquarters to another, and on all manner of other commissions, which might never otherwise have been delivered, were safely carried to their destination by his "flying corps."

Next Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock the Van will be dedicated at a service of St. Paul's Church, when the public will be welcome. It is expected that most of the Island Clergy will be present and the Van will be dedicated by the Venerable Archdeacon White, Archdeacon of the Island. At this service both the Van officers will deliver short addresses after the dedication outside the church if the weather is fine.

ZION CHURCH

'Called to be Saints,' was the theme of the morning service. The idea that underlies the word is separateness devoted to some holy purpose. In the afternoon a large representation of Zion Choir visited the Highfield Presbyterian Church, they led the congregational praise service and rendered two special numbers. Mrs. Rodgerson played the accompaniment. Mr. Fulton preached the sermon. The evening subject was of unusual interest. Christ's ideal of the Marriage relationship was discussed as found in Matt XIX:1 Many problems submitted to his judgement which received scant notice. But He gave fullness of detail re nature and obligations of the family. This is the only subject for which he prescribed specific legislation. His theology might be summed up as a transfiguration of the family. His habitual sympathy for domestic life; His attitude towards woman was marked by both insight and courage. Nothing could be more contrary to the Spirit of Jesus than to say with Esbel that "the Christian doctrine exhibits the same contempt for women which all oriental religions manifest." Viewed from Israel's moral backwardness we have three goals of moral attainment: (1) The state which represents the moral average; (2) The Church, which as a spiritual verity represents the moral aristocracy; (3) The Kingdom of God which is Christ's ideal. The Church must keep its ideal clear and progress in its ideal, that the state may be educated in such matters. At the morning service the choir rendered the anthem "Trust in Him Always" and Miss Christina Miller sang the well known song "The Holy City," by Adams. The music at the evening service comprised the anthem "A Song is in the Night" by Smith and a mixed quartet rendered the gospel hymn, "The Saviour with me." The singers in this number were Mrs. Sutherland McLean, Mrs. A. A. Mutch, Messrs Leonard Sutherland and Norman MacPherson.
