Almost simultaneously with Mr. Curtin's announcement, Japanese bombers extended their forays to within 800 miles of Australia, force bombing the Australian air force base at Rabaul in the Bismarck archipelago. In the first attack, a communiqué said, a few bombs were dropped, and some damage was done to installations at the field and a few natives in the vicinity were killed or wounded.

"HOT" BOMBER PILOT

One of the "hottest" bombing pilots with the R. C. A. F. overseas is 21-year-old Sergt.-Pilot Donald Moss, Toronto. Member of a general reconnaissance squadron making regular raids on German coastal and high seas shipping, Sergt. Moss is piloting a Hudson bomber and has sunk two German ships in the English Channel in dealing out punishment to the enemy ships, the young airman dived his bomber through a blazing curtain of anti-aircraft fire sent up by the convoy.

me and the confidence reposed in me by their governments in appointing me supreme commander in the southwest," he said. "I am fully conscious that it is a great responsibility which rests on me in the situation where the treacherous Japanese have given their forces an initial advantage.

He made no effort to conceal and, rather, emphasized that it will not be possible to reverse the situation with one blow.

But, he declared, "we can throw these Japanese freebooters from the places they have temporarily seized."

Referring lightly to the magnitude of his assignment he said: "It looks like quadruplets this time... I shall do my best to look after them and bring them up the way they should be brought up."

He said the first phase, in some ways, was parallel with the situation which confronted Britain in the Middle East in 1940 after the collapse of France.

"We must hold on with what we have until we can collect our forces for the return blow," he said.

Never before since the Indian command had Sir Archibald received newspapermen at a conference in his own home. He bade them farewell with an expression of regret for leaving India with whose effort he said he was greatly impressed, and with apologies for the brevity of the conference.
