**BOMB THROWER WAS CAPTURED**

MADRID, June 3.—The capture and suicide on Saturday night at Torregon De Ardon, of Manuel Morales, the chief suspect in the bomb outrage against the King and Queen, adds another dramatic chapter to the incidents surrounding the royal wedding. Morales was recognized in Torregon De Ardon. A guard sought to detain him but the suspect drew a revolver, shot the guard dead and tried to escape. A number of inhabitants of the town were upon him and turning the weapon upon himself, he shot himself in the region of the heart during a few minutes later. The proprietor of the hotel from the balcony of which Morales threw the bomb, viewed the body today, completely identifying it. The body was brought to Madrid, as the inhabitants of Torregon De Ardon indignantly refused to permit interment in this town. The body was exposed this afternoon for the purpose of allaying public indignation. Public feeling was intense.

The American envoy to the royal wedding, Frederick W. Whitridge and suite, had an opportunity for a brief conversation with King Alfonso during the reception at the palace yesterday. The conversation naturally turned to the attempt on the life of the King and Queen. Alfonso shrugged his shoulders and made the following significant statement: "Yes, fortunately, it was unsuccessful, but it will come again. It may be any time—perhaps tomorrow, perhaps within a month perhaps within a year—but it will come." Although he bore himself splendidly during the terrible experience, the courtiers witnessed a trying scene as the King and Queen hurried within the castle after the attempt was made to assassinate them. Turning to Queen Victoria, her dress spattered with blood, he exclaimed, "Why did I bring you to this country? It was wrong; you never should have come here."

**ANGLICANS BUY GARRISON CHURCH**

HALIFAX, June 2. Bishop Worrell has secured from the Imperial war department the Old Garrison Church for about \$15,000. He will place it at the disposal of the congregation of Trinity church, which will be sold, and the congregation will worship in the Garrison. To do this some arrangement will be made with St. George's parish, in whose territory the Garrison Church is located.

**NO MORE NEED RELIEF IN JAPAN**

OTTAWA, June 3.—A cable message has been received at the consulate general of Japan, in the city, from the foreign minister at Tokio, that the famine-stricken people in the north-eastern provinces, who so much depended upon outside relief, will be in a much more favorable situation when the summer crops of grain are harvested, and may need no further relief. As a result of this message the Canadian relief funds will be closed. The total amount contributed, including the Dominion grant, is about \$30,000. Of this sum The Halifax Herald collected \$13,500.
