News and Gossip From Town and Country.

BOARD OF TRADE meeting to-night at 8 o'clock.
SUPERINTENDENT SHARP was a passenger by the train from the west yesterday morning.

THE Park Roadway by law makes the law regulating the driving of carriages on the streets of the city applicable to that thoroughfare. The centre of the roadway is set apart for horses and carriages, the pathway next to the water is reserved for pedestrians only, and the upper walk for pedestrians and bicyclists.

A BRIEF item in the GUARDIAN'S Summerside correspondence on the 8th instant casually mentioned that the cause of the Northumberland arriving late on that day was, "as usual, the detention on the C P R." By this was probably meant no more than that the mail was late in reaching Point du Chene, but the words "as usual" were unjust to the C P R. A note from Mr A H Notman, Assistant General Passenger Agent at St John, tells that in this case, the cause was C P R., but wholly unavoidable; both the Boston and Montreal trains, consisting of sixteen cars, being held up by a freight wreck near Welsford, caused by a broken wheel, and therefore unavoidable. The record of the C P R this year has been almost invariably the arrival of both these trains in St John, and delivery to the I C R, on time. The same applied many times last year, but instead of being able to do the station work there in 15 minutes, the I C R, many times detained the train 30, 40 minutes and over, and invariably the cause was laid at the door of the C P R.

THE WEATHER.
WASHINGTON, July 12. [Special]—Warmer, brisk to high northeasterly wind becoming south westerly.

MR NEIL MCKENZIE, post-master of Canoe Cove, in June last imported from J E Brethour, of Burford, Ontario, a four months' old improved Yorkshire boar, a registered animal, known as Oak Lodge, Clarence Third. Mr Brethour has already looked carefully into the Canadian end of the trade, he having spent some time in the Davies and Fearman packing houses for this purpose. He now intends securing knowledge of the English end of the business, and has promised, on his return, to give readers of The Sun the benefit of his investigations.
