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Fire Chiefs Discuss Hazards

HALIFAX, July 25.—(By The Canadian Press) Hungry flames leaped high into the air and sent clouds of smoke over Citadel Hill today but they didn't have a chance against the fire-doubling chemicals demonstrated before more than 100 members of the Dominion Association of fire chiefs, in annual convention here.

Gasoline, oil, alcohol, laquers and moving-picture films were fuel for the fires, which were quickly extinguished by the chemicals.

After the practical demonstration, the fire chiefs returned to their headquarters for a business meeting, at which various hazards were discussed.

R. P. Dey, of Pembroke, Ontario, condemned visible gasoline tanks and declared that regulations should be issued to the effect that all such tanks must be kept underground. His suggestion found favor, and the legislative committee was instructed to draw up a resolution.

Desirability of providing adequate ventilation facilities in new buildings was stressed by A. S. Kappela of Stratford, Ontario, who said the accumulation of smoke and gas in a building often delayed the firemen from extinguishing blazes. He explained the quickest methods of ventilating a building in which fire had broken out.

W. Matrella of St. Thomas, Ontario, told about some of the difficulties of fighting fires in small towns. He said the old method of sealing a building when it caught fire had been abandoned in favor of ventilation.

C. W. Thompson of Vancouver read a paper on "Training Competent Drivers for Fire Apparatus," in which he stated that "the really competent driver must have a sense of touch, judgment of pace and distance that cannot be taught him."

Discussion of the necessity for constantly repairing motored apparatus drew a remark from Karl Walker of Fredericton that he had one piece of apparatus that never failed him—it was drawn by horses.

Fire Commissioner David K. Walsh of Montreal read a paper on "How to Curb Incendiarism in Times of Depression," and R. P. Dey of Pembroke, Ontario, called for cooperation of Fire Departments, Law officers and Insurance companies in combatting arson.

Chief H. Guerin of Kitchener, Ontario, Vice-President of the Association, presided at the meeting. The Late Chief Raoul Gauthier of Montreal was President.

Position Of The Free State

OTTAWA, July 25.—The position of the Irish Free State, as given to the Canadian Press Saturday by a member of the delegation, is that this delegation will participate to the fullest extent possible in the deliberations of the Imperial Conference, having in mind the present conditions existing between the Free State and the United Kingdom.

When asked with regard to a published report which attributes to Sean T. O'Kelly the statement that "we are drawing up proposals for negotiations with the United Kingdom, and intend to present them," the delegate declared that while the statement was correct, the inference drawn from them was not correct.

"The statement," he said, "does not necessarily mean that these proposals would be presented at the present Imperial Economic Conference. Obviously the inference is that so far as the Free State is concerned the door is still open for negotiation. Some time must elapse before any such negotiations can be entered into. When these will begin is another matter."

The delegate agreed that the presentation of proposals by the Free State to the United Kingdom at the present conference would be inconsistent with the statements previously made by both Mr. O'Kelly and J. H. Thomas that the difficulties between the two countries would not be raised at this conference. Any attempt to formulate trading agreements would necessitate the raising of these problems, which it is the expressed desire of the British and Free State delegations to avoid.

Seek Method To Help Unemployed

BOSTON, July 25.—Governor John G. Winant, of New Hampshire addressing a distinguished gathering of business and industrial executives, economists and social workers, today opened the joint conference on the flexible work day and week, a plan which its sponsors believe would add 3,000,000 persons to pay rolls in the United States.

The conference was called for the purpose of discussing a plan for the re-distribution of available work among available workers. Testimonial statements of nationally known industrialists and economists were read.

Governor Winant, as chairman of the committee arranging the conference, said that the plan, which originated in New Hampshire, "would restore to industrial, commercial and other employment any desired number of those at present unemployed."

Inventor Dead

NEWTON, Mass., July 25.—Professor Reginald Q. Fessenden, physicist and engineer, who died yesterday in Bermuda, was hailed by Elihu Thomson as "the greatest wireless inventor of the age—greater than Marconi." He maintained a residence here for many years.

More than 20 years ago he established what is claimed to be the first broadcasting station in the world, a tower at Grant Rock from which voices were sent across the Atlantic to Scotland. He perfected a wireless receiver 2,000 times as sensitive as Marconi's old coherer, and the Fessenden oscillator which made possible communication between men trapped in a sunken submarine and surface ships. Professor Fessenden repeatedly was involved in patent litigation, and he was uniformly successful in his court actions. In 1928 he received settlement of \$2,500,000 in cash from a group of communication corporations as the outcome of a suit for \$360,000,000.

Prof. Fessenden was born of New England parents, in Milton, Que., October 6, 1866. He was educated at Bishop's College, and became associated with the late Thomas A. Edison in 1886. He taught at Purdue and later was connected with various companies.
