RETURN FROM HALIFAX—Major W. H. Poole, vice-chairman of the Civil Defence Committee A. R. P. and Mr. Norman Dawe, secretary, returned to Charlottetown Saturday by plane after conferring with the A.R.P. officials and with the personnel of M.D. No. 6 in Halifax. They left here Thursday morning by plane and after a brief visit with members of the A.R.P. committee in Moncton continued through to Halifax. On Thursday night they landed with interest to the remarks of Col. R. J. Manion, M.D., director of Civilian Defence for Canada when he conferred with the Halifax A.R.P. organization. The following day they met with the Provincial A.R.P. Committee for Nova Scotia and on Saturday morning with officials of Military District No. 6. While in Halifax Major Poole and Mr. Dawe experienced a blackout Thursday night and had the privilege of driving about the city in the official car. They were impressed by the thoroughness of the test there. The purpose of their trip was to study the set-up in the other Maritime Provinces so as to make the Island organization conform with them. MAGDALEN FLIGHTS—Thirteen passengers and 1,400 pounds of mail and 300 pounds of express were flown to the Magdalen Islands by planes of Maritime Central Airways yesterday. The last flight of a plane to the Gulf Islands was made several days ago and a growing list of passengers, as well as a great quantity of mail, made yesterday's flight necessary. Capt. Carl Burke took off from the airport here at two o'clock in the afternoon carrying six passengers and 700 pounds of mail in the Barkley-Grow plane. About 430 shortly after he returned. Capt. Jimmie Wade left with seven passengers, 700 pounds of mail and 300 pounds of express in the Beech aircraft for the Magdalen Islands. The passengers making the trip were landed at Grimstone Island and three at Amherst. The planes landed on the ice using wheels. Three passengers were taken back to Charlottetown.

Detroit Clinches Fifth Place By Splitting Weekend Games With Canadiens

DETROIT, March 15—(CP)—The Detroit Red Wings clinched fifth place in the National Hockey League race by defeating the Montreal Canadiens, 4-1, before 9,507 spectators tonight. The victory assured Detroit of home ice for the start of its playoff series, particularly important in view of its current six-game home winning streak.

With 25 seconds to play, the two clubs engaged in another mass tussle encounter, a sequel to their free-for-all battle at Montreal Saturday, and referee Bill Chadwick sent six players, three from each club, to the penalty bench with major infractions.

Jack Stewart and Pat McReavy scored for Detroit in the first two periods before Joe Benoit notched Montreal's one goal, and then Carl Liscombe blasted home a pair shots 78 seconds apart in the third period to assure victory. This gave Detroit the lead in the A.H.A. and over Canadiens with one game to play.

Rangers Clinch First Place In N. H. L. Standing

CHICAGO, March 15—(AP)—New York Rangers tonight clinched first place in the National Hockey League standings as they defeated Chicago Black Hawks 5-1 before 16,381 persons at the Chicago Stadium.

It was the Rangers' final game of the season and the victory gave them 60 points to 57 for second place Toronto which still has one game to play.

In winning their 29th game of the season the Rangers also broke the league scoring record with 177 goals, highest ever achieved under present rules. The old record held by Toronto was 174.

Americans Retain Slim Chance Of Making Playoffs Are Held On Saturday

NEW YORK, March 15—(CP)—Brooklyn Americans who refuse to be counted out of the National Hockey League's playoffs, tonight retained their slim chance of grabbing sixth place by defeating Toronto Maple Leafs 6-3 in a fast game before 8,976 fans at Madison Square Garden.

With Canadiens losing to Detroit, the Montrealers' edge over Brooklyn was cut to two points. Each team has one game left, Canadians tonight, Americans at Boston on Tuesday. A Canadian victory would result in a tie—37 points each—in which the decision would be on goals scored, where Brooklyn now leads with 130 goals to 127.

However, a Canadian win, a Brooklyn loss, or a tie by either, would put the Montrealers in.

TORONTO, March 15—(CP)—Boston's crippled but still gallant Bruins will have to settle for third place in the National Hockey League. The last hope the world champions entertained of finishing second vanished here Saturday night when the Maple Leafs downed them 6-4.

The Bruins opened the scoring in the fourth minute of play but the Leafs were in front 2-1 before the initial period closed. Both Toronto goals came while the champions were still handed due to penalties. The Leafs held a 4-2 advantage at the close of the second.

The Leafs added 16 scoring points to their averages. Nick Metz, Dave Schriener and Billy Taylor each clocked for two goals. Schriener also being credited with an assist. Lorne Carr and Wally Stanowski each scored three assists.

Jack McGill, rookie plucked from Boston Olympics amateurs to replace the injured Owey, paced the Bruins with two goals.

Bill Hollett, the game's outstanding performer, counted Boston's first tally on a breakaway with Dutch Hiller. The same pair combined to move the Bruins within a goal of the Leafs early in the third period, after they had trailed by three goals in the second. Hiller was the marksman.
