The firemen were called out shortly before noon yesterday for a slight fire at the residence of R. V. Rossborough, Upper Prince St.

The death occurred at the Provincial Infirmary on Sunday of John Clinton, aged 76, a native of this city. The funeral took place yesterday.

Artamas McPhee, Lorne Valley, has been spending the past week at his old home in Earncliffe. Mr. McPhee has purchased a valuable year old filly from John McKinnon.

On February 20th the Angel of Death visited the home of Daniel and Mrs. Macaulay, Earncliffe, and took from them their beloved son Angus, aged twenty-nine years. Mr. Macaulay has been in ill-health for the last two years, having contracted a cold while in Sydney, C. B. Everything that a loving father and mother could do was done to relieve his suffering. Great hopes were held at times for his recovery but death finally claimed him. His bright and manly disposition endeared him to all who had the pleasure of knowing him. He was a devout Christian, always loving and trusting in Jesus, and his last thoughts and words were of his Saviour. Besides his father and mother he leaves to mourn a loving wife, three sisters and three brothers. His funeral was largely attended. The services at the house were conducted by Rev. Mr. MacKenzie assisted by Rev. F. Dresser.—Com.

The death took place at the Hospital in Vancouver, B. C., on the 18th day of January, last of Duncan McKenzie of Junction Road aged thirty-three years, son of Mal. McKenzie. The deceased was foreman at the Rat Portage Lumber Camps, Nelson Island, sixty miles from Vancouver. He was suddenly stricken with pleuro-pneumonia and conveyed to the Hospital where he expired after an illness of three days. The burial took place on the twenty-fifth and was largely attended. The United Brotherhood of America of which the deceased was an honored member had charge of the funeral arrangements. Rev. A. Macaulay of Rock Bay, B. C. Presbyterian missionary to the logging camps along the Pacific coast, conducted the funeral services when all that was mortal of the deceased was committed to their last resting place. The following are left to mourn:—a father and a mother, one brother William, at home, three sisters, Mrs. John McLennan, Hd of Montague and Ray and Sadie at home.

Much disappointment was felt and expressed that the Rev. B. O. Hartman of Montague was unable through illness, "grippe", to keep his appointments at Vernon River and Cherry Valley on Sunday and Monday, March 12th and 13th, in the interests of the missionary cause and wishes were many for his recovery and that at a later date his promise might be fulfilled. The weather was unusually fine and good congregations gathered. The pastor, Rev. George Orman, conducted the services and preached, taking as the lessons for the day the 13th and 14th Chapter of Acts and comment thereon. His text was "So mightily grew the word of God and prevailed." His exposition was chiefly confined to historic records, the testimony not of missionaries or ministers but of distinguished travellers, Hindu judges, lieutenant governors and governor generals of the British Empire, ex-President Roosevelt, etc. The musical part of the services was fine and well rendered. Miss Margaret Furness gave great pleasure by her splendid rendering of appropriate solos. On Monday evening in Vernon River Church a sacred concert was given by the choir who rendered three anthems excellently—"Come Unto Me," "Nearer My God to Thee," "I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say." The Misses Laura and Margaret Vandenberg rendered a couple of duets in a way and manner that gave great pleasure to all who heard them. Milton Furness was in excellent form and gave two recitals most acceptably. Miss Margaret Furness sang with her accustomed clearness and charm.

\$25,000,000 ADDED TO THE U. S. INCOME

WASHINGTON, March 13—The corporation tax provisions of the Payne-Aldrich tariff act were sustained today by the supreme court of the United States. The decision was unanimous. Thereby a source of income of approximately \$25,000,000 annually was assured to the government.

Of all the objections to the tax raised by suits in all parts of the country, none of them was found sufficient to nullify the law. The court did hold that the tax was not applicable to the real estate trusts of Boston, which are organized not under any statute, but under the common law. The law was held not applicable to the Minneapolis syndicate, a real estate concern, on the ground that it was not doing business within the meaning of the law.

The fight against the constitutionality of the corporation tax began almost immediately after the enactment of the Payne-Aldrich tariff law of 1909, of which it is a part. The provisions of the law stated that the tax was a special excise tax with respect to the carrying on or doing business. It was to be paid by every corporation, joint stock company or association organized for profit and having a capital stock represented by shares and every insurance company, organized under the law of the United States or of any state or territory. It was provided that the tax should be equivalent to one per centum upon the entire income and over and above \$5,000 received from all sources, exclusive of amounts received as dividends upon stock of other corporations, joint stock companies or associations, or insurance companies subject to the tax. The law provides also that returns should be made by those taxed to the treasury department, to be used as a basis for assessing the tax. These were open to inspection, but in 1910 congress enacted legislation providing that the returns should be open to inspection only upon rules and regulations approved by the president.

Tomorrow is St. Patrick's day and this year will be celebrated in the usual manner by those who revere St. Patrick as their patron Saint. It is to be noted that at a recent meeting in Montreal of the St. Patrick's Total Abstinence Society it was proposed to change the day of parade to the Sunday preceding the 17th. The agitation toward this end, which was strong, was eventually lost. Such a movement here, it is quite properly thought, would be discontinued at its earliest stages as in Charlottetown the memory of St. Patrick has been freshened annually on the 17th day of March, whether it fell on Sunday or a week day—and there is no likelihood for a change.

Faces beamed with goodfellowship and all were in the happiest of moods in the vestry of the First Presbyterian church last night, when members of the Maritime Provinces association of Worcester had their 24th annual banquet. A few intimate friends had been invited until 162 covers were set at a recent meeting in Worcester of the Presbyterian church and president of the association, welcomed the members in a hearty greeting in the opening number of the night's program. He spoke of the organization, its objects and the achievements of the natives of the provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island—Worcester Post.

At this banquet there were a large number of provincialists present. The banquet was enlivened by an excellent program of vocal and instrumental music and among the speakers was Worcester's mayor, who delivered an eloquent address on "Love of Country."

The death of Mrs. Jno. McQuaghey, Bonshaw, occurred Feb. 28th. The deceased who was in her fifty-ninth year, had suffered from an attack of la grippe which soon turned to congestion of the lungs. All that medicine and the care of loving hands could do were not able to banish that disease and she passed away to sleep her last long sleep. She was a faithful member of the Roman Catholic Church and a devoted wife and mother. She leaves to mourn a heart broken husband, four daughters: Mrs. Wm. McQuaghey, Riverview; Mrs. Jas. McMurter, DeSable; Mrs. Jno. McQuaghey, Lynn, Mass.; Mrs. Hudson McKenna, Waterford, and six sons: David and Pius, Lynn, Mass.; Gervase, black-smith in Carleton; and Jno. E., Jerome and Leo, at home. All were present but Mrs. McQuaghey, who was absent through illness at the funeral. Her remains were followed by a large number of relatives and friends. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. T. Curran and interment was made in the Cemetery of Kelly's Cross, there to await the judgment of the Just.
