### EARTHQUAKE KILLS

(Canadian Press.) TOKIO, March 17.—Eighty three persons according to estimate were killed by an earthquake which occurred yesterday in Atika Island off Hondo and five hundred injured.

### ANNIVERSARY IS CELEBRATED

(Canadian Press.) NIEL, March 17.—German survivors of the great hurricane which destroyed German and American war vessels at Apia Samoa March 16, 1889, met here today to celebrate the twenty-sixth anniversary of the disaster. The catastrophe occurred during the International dispute over Samoa which called British, German, and American warships there.

### CYCLONE GALE IN HOMELAND

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, March 17.—A cyclone gale swept the United Kingdom today from west to east. The wind reached 70 miles an hour and lasted 12 hours. Many vessels were driven ashore and the channel packet service is practically suspended. A ship foundered in the Thames with the loss of five lives. The Dutch steamer Noodwick was disabled off the Isle of Wight and much property damage on land resulted from the storm.

### DISTINCTION FOR KING GEORGE

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, March 17.—King George attained distinction tonight, being the first reigning British Monarch to witness a public exhibition of the noble art of self defence. As guest of the Second Rifle Guards of which he is colonel. He was entertained at boxing and fencing matches in Regent Park Barracks.

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, March 17.—James Gordon Bennett, owner of the New York Herald is seriously ill on his yacht in Suez.

### EDITOR IS SHOT

(Canadian Press.) Paris, March 17.—Gaston Calmette, Editor of Figaro was shot today by Madame Henriette Caillaux, wife of the French Minister of Finance. Calmette died tonight. The motive was vengeance for an attack on the Minister by the paper.

### MARCONI WIRELESS MESSAGE TRAVELLS 4,062 MILES

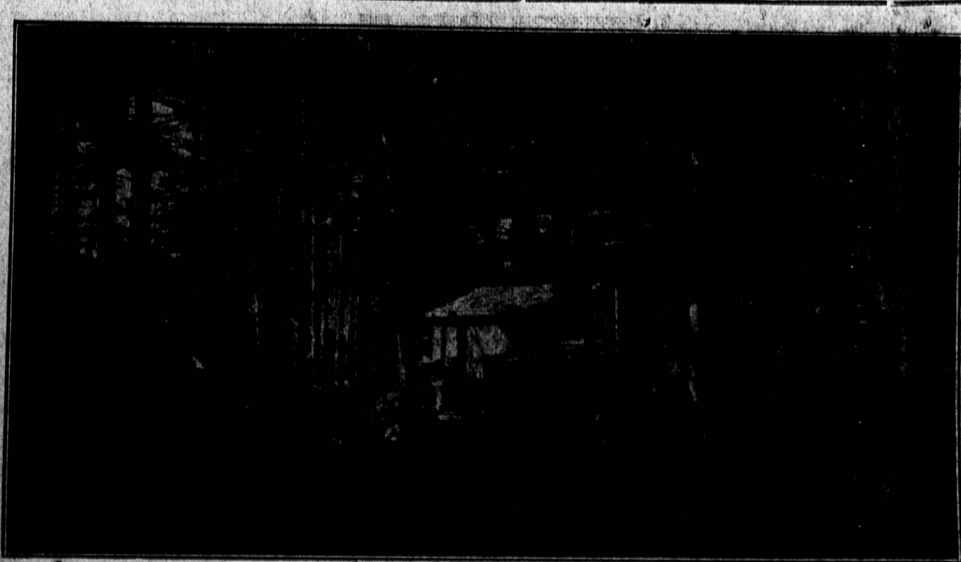
