PLEADS NOT GUILTY.—Peter Murray, 62, boarding house proprietor, of Saint John was charged with manslaughter Saturday following an inquest into the death of Emanuel Perry, 50, longshoreman formerly of P. E. I. Appearing before Magistrate S. W. Palmer, Murray was remanded until next Wednesday. The accused, landlord of the house where Perry rented a room, declined to say anything at the inquest aside from declaring he was "not guilty." Witnesses testified he had been intoxicated before and after the death, and had admitted striking Perry with his fist. The coroner's jury found he had met death at the hands of a person or persons unknown.

BRILLIANT STUDENTS.—Mr. Ernest Poole Weeks, B.A., son of Rev. E. S. Weeks, of Millstream, N. B., has begun his second year at Oxford University, England. He has travelled extensively during the past summer in Norway, Denmark, Germany, Scotland and in the North of England. As a Rhodes scholar, his scholarship provides him with about \$2,000 per year for three years. His youngest sister, Jean, is at Mr. Allison on her first year in Arts. She has been chosen vice-president of her class which members 170. ST. PAUL'S CHURCH

The morning service was conducted by Rev. E. R. G. Bridgewater, rector of the parish of Crapaud and Springfield. Taking for his text St. John, 2:2, "And He is the propitiation for our sins and not for ours only but for the sins of the whole world," the speaker pointed out that sacrifice had been observed through all ages and by all religions; some in order to conciliate the gods, others as an offering for sin. The sin of man against man did not require the sacrifice of Christ as did the sin of man against God. The great idea of the sacrifice of the Cross is Jesus Christ who lived, suffered and died in order to make all mankind "at one" with God. The Atonement was not a covering up but a complete blotting out of man's sin.

 It's a list of diseases against which the public health service is fighting. Heart disease ranks as public enemy No. 1. It causes more deaths than any other. The rest of the list, rated according to the number of deaths caused by the affliction, is: No. 2, cancer; 3, apoplexy; 4, bright's disease; 5, pneumonia; 6, tuberculosis; 7, infant mortality; 8, influenza; 9, sugar diabetes; 10, diarrheal disease.
