**Soccer Clubs Comb Empire For Players**

LONDON, Dec. 5.—(G.P.)—Never in the history of Association football in this country has there been such a dearth of first-class players as now, says a special writer in The Sporting Life.

To fill the gaps which inevitably occur in the best regulated League teams managers are beginning to comb the Empire in their search for promising recruits. Most of them are being taken from South Africa, to the disadvantage of that dominion, but several have been taken from Canada.

Clubs that have capable players will not part with them except at exorbitant prices and even the money bags of the Arsenal cannot always command the players they need. The trouble is, in the eyes of the writer, that young players in the Old Country are not coming along fast enough. Even those available are not, in many cases, getting their chances because some clubs are too impatient to devote the necessary time to polishing them.

With the greatest field for recruiting, the continent barred by the ministry of labor's ruling against alien players, the clubs are turning to any part of the Empire where association football is played. The visit of the South African eleven in 1924-25 was something of an eye-opener.

Liverpool has set the pace for Empire's importations, the Anfield club this season having taken Nieuwenhuys, outside right, Carr, outside left and Anderson, centre-half, from South Africa. Plymouth Argyle went to South Africa for Aitken and Atkinson, and Chelsea brought Gibb from the Transvaal. From Canada, Plymouth secured their centre-half, Fairley. Glasgow

Rangers have taken George Jenkins from Montreal. Crystal Palace and Manchester United has brought McManus from To onto. Scottish Burnley secured Charles, a back, from Trinidad.

Many of these players have come over merely on trial, which in itself demonstrates the shortage of home-produced players. That it should pay clubs like Chelsea, tailing the first division, Burnley and Argyle to bring players thousands of miles on trial is eloquent of the situation.

The Sporting Life writer expressed the opinion South Africa has a good cause for complaint at the loss of so many valuable players in the past few years. Not long ago English clubs were "raided" in the same fashion, and there were loud outcries when Andy Wilson and Alex Cheyne of Chelsea and some lesser lights went to French clubs.

He continues: "There seems something wrong about this peaching of players by clubs who themselves are fenced in by protective barriers such as apprentices for other sports—or businesses for that matter. Within the magic circle of the League no player may be approached, much less tempted away, so long as he is on a club's books, so South Africa seems wide open to the poacher."

"The is another equally grave aspect of the matter. While clubs are content to scour the earth for ready-made players, what is to become of embryonic home talent? Surely the plan of Tottenham Hotspur, who, like some other clubs, run their own nursery, and generally speaking, school their own players is the more sane and more enduring! The Spurs' position at the top of the English football world, the result of encouraging youth and enthusiasm, points the way to football progress and prosperity."
