IMPERIAL POSTAGE RATES.—The attention of the public is called to the fact that the Imperial rate of postage as regards letters posted in Canada for Newfoundland, the charge being four cents for a one-cent letter, and three cents additional for each extra ounce. There appears to have been considerable irritation caused to Newfoundland addresses of letters posted in Canada owing to their being insufficiently prepaid, involving collection of double the deficiency on delivery at destination.

NEW POSTAL RATES.—Post office notes for certain fixed sums, from twenty cents up to ten dollars, are sold and paid at 10,000 Post Offices in Canada, and are also payable in Newfoundland, but not at present in the United States. The commission including war tax, is only three to six cents according to the value of the Note. Postal Notes may be purchased at any time between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., and if lost or destroyed they will be duplicated by the Post Office Department. This is the most simple, convenient and safe means of making remittances, particularly of small amounts.

EASTER MAIL.—It is desired that at the coming Easter season the public should discontinue, as far as possible, the use of small cards and envelopes for mailing purposes. Following are some of the objections to the use of small cards and envelopes: 1. The Post Office cancellation mark frequently falls on the address, partially obliterating it, with the possibility that the article may be misdelivered or delayed. There is difficulty in the Post Office sorting and handling of small cards and envelopes, and this unavoidable causes delay. 2. There is also difficulty in putting small cards or envelopes through stamp cancelling machines at larger offices, and this, too, causes delay. 3. The small size of the cards or envelopes makes them apt to fall out of bundles in which they are tied, and there is the possibility of loss as a result of this. Responsibility for loss, misdelivery or delay as outlined above, arising from the use of small cards or envelopes, rests entirely with the sender.

Locally there are no changes but as stocks are not large there is a strong possibility for some advances as importers state spot prices are still far below cost of replacement." Those who understand the tea situation say that unless the price becomes easier on the primary market very soon the consumer may expect to pay 10 or 15 cents more a pound for tea.

Fire Casualties

HAZLETON, B. C., Frank Walsh, Vancouver, was burned to death and four structures in the business quarter of Hazelton were destroyed by fire which originated early this morning in the Hazelton Hotel. The property damage will be about \$15,000. Four Indians from Babin Lake were supposed to be in the hotel last night but they have not been found, dead or alive and may have fallen victims of fire.

Deaths in Belfast

BELFAST, April 3.—The roll of fatal casualties from factional disorders in Belfast reached the total 61 for month of March, the blackest month in the Belfast story. The last victim of the month was Francis Flynn, who died Friday from the effects of injuries received in a recent bombing outrage.
