WESTERN COMMENT—The Calgary Herald of the 14th inst., contains the following reference to Lieut. Joseph L. MacPherson of West Royalty, P.E.I., accompanied by an excellent half-tone portrait: "Lieut. MacPherson was formerly accountant of the Canadian Bank of Commerce in this city, and is well known throughout the west in financial circles. He left here as lance-corporal and was promoted to lieutenant while on active service in France. He was recently reported wounded."

BLACK FOX INDUSTRY—The St. John Telegraph says:—Robert L. Todd of Milltown, ranch-manager for the New England Karakule Sheep and Fur Company, was in the city for a short time yesterday while en route to Moncton. Mr. Todd is to bring back from Moncton a pair of pure black foxes, which after a short rest at the ranch in Milltown, will be shipped to Boston. The demand for pelts, this year, will be far in excess of the supply, Mr. Todd says, and he believes that the fox raising industry in this section has still a bright future.

KNOWN IN CHARLOTTETOWN—The Barbadoes Agricultural Reporter of August 10th records the death of Mr. Thomas E. Manning of the firm of Manning and Co. Ltd. The late Mr. Manning was known in Charlottetown where he visited some years ago, accompanied by his wife and daughter. His son Gerald, now Ophthalmic Surgeon of the General Hospital in Barbadoes, attended Prince of Wales College previous to taking his medical course at McGill. Dr. Gerald is well remembered by many citizens of Charlottetown.

MADE SUB-DEACONS—In St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday morning, His Lordship Bishop O'Leary conferred the Order of Sub-Deacon on Messrs. W. E. Cameron, Francis Hughes and John Emmet Dougan. He was assisted by Revs. Joseph Rooney and C. J. McDonald as assistant priests, while Rev. P. F. Hughes was Master of Ceremonies. His Lordship will ordain these young men Deacons on Sunday August 27th, at 8 o'clock Mass in the Cathedral. It is understood that they will be elevated to the dignity of the Priesthood on Sunday, Sept. 3rd, at Grand River, by His Lordship, Rt. Rev. J. T. McNally, Bishop of Calgary, whose subjects the above mentioned young men are.

BON VOYAGE—Professor and Mrs. S. B. McCready and their children, Master Alex. and the Misses Mary, Margaret and Helen are leaving this morning on return to Guelph, Ontario, where they will reside. Professor McCready accepted the supervision of the Nature Study Department of Prince of Wales College only for a year and although many who have been in close touch with the splendid work he did, not only as a teacher and an organizer but as a public spirited citizen, had hoped that his stay would be prolonged beyond the stipulated period, he adhered to his original intention to resume his work at Guelph. He and his family will be greatly missed in Charlottetown where they have become great favorites, and a host of friends will wish them well wherever they may be. They purpose spending a day or two at Quebec and also at Montreal.

The following has been received from the old land by a resident in Prince County, which speaks well for Sir Sam Hughes:
"If the people of these islands were able to meet General Sir Sam Hughes and welcome him, their welcome would astonish the world. If by some accident he returned to London at the head of his Canadian soldiers he would get acclamations that Canada could never forget. All our great cities and towns are eager to do him honor.
It is not our fault that we have had no opportunity of showing our pride and our gratitude to the great Canadian organizer of victory. But we desire to let Canada know what we think of the man who will be remembered forever as the Kitchener of Canada.
Sir Sam Hughes is Canada incarnate. The Canadian army is his work. He made it. He started to make it when he was a boy of sixteen by joining the Cadet Corps. He was the first Canadian to volunteer for the South African War. His faith in the citizen soldiers of Canada is not a new thing. It sprang out of his lifework.
"As Minister of Militia and Defence he prepared Canada for the storm which broke on the Empire in 1914. He stamped on the soil of Canada when the storm broke, and a great army of Canadian soldiers rose who fought like lions beside their blood-brothers.
"The Canadian soldiers call him the 'Father of the Continentals.' They also call him 'General Sam.' They love him as the British soldier used to love Lord Roberts. Why? Because he is a leader of men. Sergeant Frank Brown, the Canadian soldier-poet, who fell at St. Eloi in February, 1915, wrote a fine ode to 'Sam' which fits the way in as fine as Kipling's tribute to 'Bobs'.
"We may hold different views on hooch, but take it from a dub—
You trained us without whiskey.
But you gave us decent grub.
And if we pull a grandstand play,
And make ourselves a name,
We'll tell them all that you're the guy
Who put us on the game.
"The Canadians have made them selves an immortal name. As soldiers they are second to none. Now that Sir Sam Hughes is once more coming in our midst let us all salute him as the Canadian Kitchener, the citizen soldier who made a great army out of plain citizens. Welcome, Brother Sam!"
