CRANBERRY GRADING

The Provincial Department of Agriculture having installed a modern up to date Cranberry cleaning and grading machine at Mount Stewart, wish to notify the growers of the Province that their cranberries will be processed, graded and put up in proper boxes according to grade, and marketed to the best possible advantage.

We have secured the services of Mr. Talbot Pierce, a Cape Cod specialist who is in charge of the equipment. This service will be rendered at actual cost to the growers. Berries delivered at the Mount Stewart plant for grading should be packed in boxes to prevent bruising. Do not use bags.

If interested, get in touch with Mr. A. L. McDonald, secretary of P.E.I. Berry Growers' Cooperative Association, Mount Stewart, or deliver at the Mount Stewart Grading warehouse.

E. I., for which they are leaving this week. Dr. Townsend, who had been minister of St. Columba for more than 30 years, preached his farewell sermon a week ago on Sunday night.
