**HELPING MISSIONS**—The late Miss Jane Clark of Kensington, left a valuable gold watch to be used by the P. E. I. Presbyterial for foreign missionary purposes. The watch was sold by the presbyterial, an offering being taken for its purchase. The proceeds were forwarded to Dr. Florence Murray of Korea, daughter of Rev. **A RARE BLOOM**—By the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Mills, a large number of lovers of flowers at Summerside were given an opportunity last Saturday night of viewing a very beautiful and rare exotic plant in bloom. It is the "Night-flowering Cereus," a species of cactus which blooms rarely, about once in three years, and the blooms of which when they open fall off in a few hours. The blossoms are about the size of a small pudding basin and almost as delicate as an orchid. Two opened on Saturday evening and fell about 10 o'clock Sunday morning. There is one other bloom on the plant this year, which looks as though it would open this (Wednesday) morning.

**PAINFUL ACCIDENT**—Counsellor Carruthers, of Summerside, met with a painful accident last (Tuesday) morning.
