got land for nothing. Here they got nothing for nothing and paid a great interest on it. He brought up the need of re-education of soldiers land in the Legislature last year and not a man had anything to say for it but himself. He intended to bring it up again this year; Mr. John Profit, Mr. W. M. Dennis and others discussed the question.

Mr. Senecabough declared the more the farm is improved, the more taxes are demanded. This was a poor system. Our own people are going away to better positions that is true. The troubles with our federal government. He did not refer to either party, but there must be something wrong with a system which permits our young people leaving us with such a heavy burden to keep a good class of immigrants, if they were enough to purchase property would be acceptable, but it is not right to spend money on bringing immigrants here who cannot be further supplied to start them in their work.

Mr. Brodie thought it was a poor policy to take immigrants to poor farms here. This is what we did some years ago. He hoped that the few who are effected now would be put on the best land available.

Standardization of Railway—This part of the address was adopted unanimously without discussion.

Agricultural High School—Mr. Brodie stressed the great expense of running the institution. He quoted operation expenses in Ontario and the small percentage of pupils who returned to the farms. He believed the government should help the young men in this matter. Let us If the Technical school makes these young men discontented it is doing more harm than good.

Mr. A. E. Devar said the farm should be made to yield money and he said the boys could not be expected to stay if they lost money. Mr. Brodie said the schools simply filled the boys' head with the idea that he was losing money.

Mr. McGregor, Lot 16, believed the best argument for the school, the discussion was continued by Messrs Profit, Stetson, McKenzie and others. The belief was expressed that the educational tendency was to lead the boys away from the farm.

Mr. W. W. Crosby believed it was too soon to criticize the Agricultural School. The federal grant for the technical training was too limited in its scope. He would suggest that the clause stand over for further discussion, he liked the idea of an Agricultural School if it could be made more general.

Mr. Brodie said that \$32,000 a year for 12 years have been drawn for agricultural improvement for the province. Has the province benefited? He contended farmers in general would be no worse off without it. Mr. A. E. Devar denied this. Technical instruction is certainly doing some good. The boy that gets the good of it is the boy who has had some practical experience. To a greenhorn the instruction may not be of much value. Mr. McGregor believed it would be unwise to cut this portion out of the address. Mr. Crosby supported to hurrying down the School.

Mr. C. L. Senecabough argued that there was something wrong with the system. He would not say whether the School was to blame or not. Every young man with an education seems to want a white collar job. Mr. Profit believed the only argument against the Technical School was the expenditure, and he doubted if this money could be spent to better advantage. Mr. John Stetson declared it is the long hours that are killing the farming business here. The work
