Christmas and its Claims.

Tomorrow we commemorate the greatest event in human history. If there is one day in the calendar more holy than another that day is the anniversary of the birth of Christ. In these modern times, as the thoughts of men are widening with the process of the suns, it is becoming more and more the vogue to hold all days and all places as holy. That is simply a recognition of the unity, the oneness, of all things and all time. But in this sceptical tendency to deny any special sanctity to special sections of time and space, it were well to begin with the lowest and the worst.

There are holidays we can spare better than Christmas. There are anniversaries that stand in the calendar apparently for no higher purpose than to mark distinctions between man and man. They are sometimes consecrated to liberty, sometimes to the memory of men who have done much or suffered much for a nation or for a national idea; but by too many these days are observed not to glorify liberty or true patriotism but to glorify a nation or a faction to the disparagement of the rest of humankind.

Not so Christmas. It is the fete day of the race. It is the festival of humanity. Not for Christendom alone it may stand; for it heralds "peace and good will" to all men on earth. For "they shall come from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south and shall sit down in the Kingdom of God." Christmas is one day during which all the brotherhood of men can rejoice. It is a day when national feuds can be forgotten. And now as we draw near to the beginning of the twentieth century it is a day when at least among professedly Christian peoples sectarian strife can be hushed and nothing remembered but the common purpose, the common love of God and men which Christ taught as the Alpha and Omega of religion.

Never was there greater need than now for united effort among men of all creeds who love justice and hate the sight of human suffering in something of the spirit of the infinite unselfishness of the Nazarene. Even now in this season when "peace, peace" is the universal cry, it is an idle cry when "there is no peace" Discord and dissension still prevail even in the ranks of those who believe in a common Leader and Master. And while "Christians" clamor over matters of form and method and discipline and mere externals, all the powers of evil—jealousy, selfishness, injustice and oppression are arrayed against the scattered forces of a disunited Christianity. But by those who try to look above the hind and wrangle of theological trials and denominational discussions, strong souls may be seen standing on the high heights pointing to the coming reign of peace. But peace in the Christian sense can only come by war against the common enemy, against wrong wherever it exists. The hope of a united Christianity, the hope of the peace which comes Christmas should smother in us, that hope is strong now because now more than ever before rises the recognition of a common enemy. A year ago, one of the great preachers of this continent voiced the new spirit of this age by quoting in thrilling tones, this epitome of the life and death of Christ and the outlook of Christianity:

"Nearly nineteen hundred years ago, when another civilization (like ours) was developing monstrous inequalities, when the masses everywhere were being ground into hopeless slavery, there arose in a Jewish village an unlearned carpenter, who, scorning the orthodoxes and ritualisms of his time, preached to laborers and fishermen the gospel of the Fatherhood of God, of the equality and brotherhood of men, who taught his disciples to pray for the coming of the Kingdom of heaven on earth. The college pro-

fessors sneered at him, the orthodox preachers denounced him. He was reviled as a dreamer, as a disturber, as a 'communist'; and, finally, organized society took the alarm and he was crucified between two thieves. But the word went forth, and spread by fugitives and slaves, made its way against power and against persecution till it revolutionized the world, and out of the rotting old civilization brought the germ of the new. Then the privileged classes rallied again, carved the effigy of the man of the people in the courts and on the tombs of kings; in his name consecrated inequality and wrested his gospel to the defence of social injustice. But again the same great ideas of a common fatherhood, of a common brotherhood, of a social state in which none shall be overworked and none shall want, began to quicken in common thought."

And now the fraternity of the race seems too well established ever again to be lost. Fraternity! We recognize it at Christmas time, We recognize it tomorrow. Shall we here in this city and province forget it again in a day? Shall we not rather strive earnestly to make it last from Christmas time to Christmas time as long as we may live? If we do, we may yet live to see at least the dawning of the new day of unbroken happiness and peace when all the years shall be one long festival of light-hearted labor and loyal-hearted love.

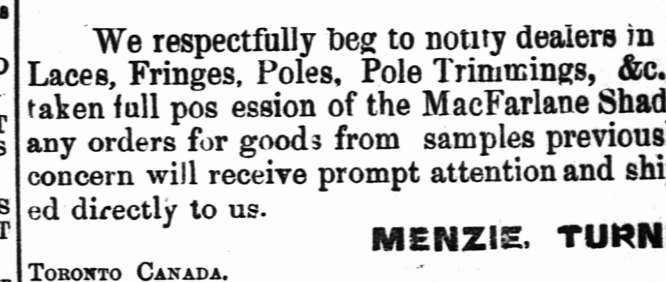
