

MR. MCCREADY'S REPORT

The following report has been submitted by Mr. J. E. B. McCreedy of the Silver Black Fox in the current year:

The Provincial Government enumeration of the foxes for this year is nearly completed but not quite so. The results are as shown in the following table:

It is to be noted that there was a considerable exportation both of silver and red foxes during the year, while there was a large importation of foxes, mainly from western Canada.

The natural increase, young foxes born and reared this year, was in silvers 1.76 per pair; in crosses 1.55; in reds 1.8 per pair. There were only two young blue foxes reported. The average increase per pair over the whole industry was slightly larger than last year.

The valuation of young silvers was almost the same this year as last—\$4,885.33 as against \$4,889.66 last year. This is considerably under the selling price, which is practically the same as last year. Prices are holding very firm, notwithstanding the war.

The sworn total value of the young foxes reared this year is \$6,577,586, of which \$6,056,190 represents silver foxes and the balance represents the cheaper crosses and reds. The government will get \$65,000 this year from the 1 per cent tax on value of young foxes.

The effect of the war and the consequent financial disturbance was to check investment and to render some purchasers of option unable to complete their purchase and take delivery of the young foxes in September. In many cases an extension of time has been given to such purchasers but in no case, so far as I am informed has the purchase price been reduced.

The conditions just alluded to have had their effect in delaying and somewhat reducing dividends of this year. The dividends earned were about equal to those of last year. If the young foxes had been taken over by the purchasers and paid for, Dividends are not usually paid until after the annual meetings of the companies which are usually held in October and November, but a number of companies have already paid dividends of 10 per cent to 50 per cent with promise of a further dividend later when their collections are all in. These payments have tended to stimulate inquiry and investment and there is a distinctly better feeling in regard to the future of the industry than was apparent some weeks ago after the first shock of war. There is no other industry or enterprise in Canada which will this year pay anything like the returns which will be shared by investors in the fox industry.
