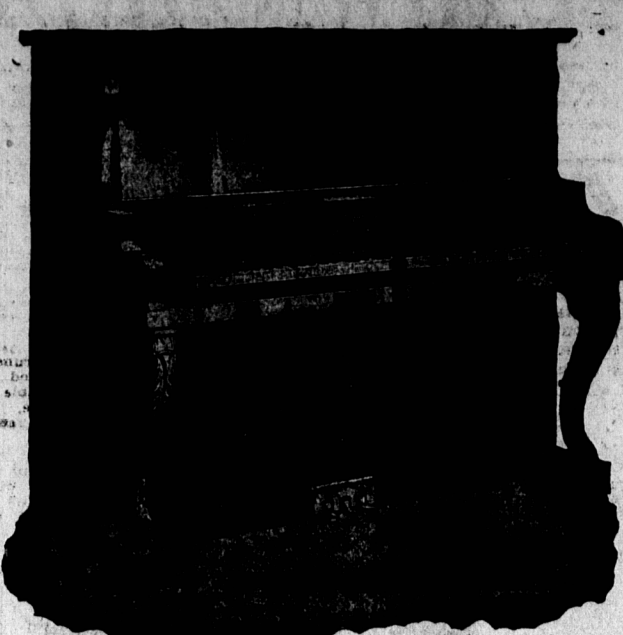

### THERE'S MANY'S THE SLIP.

REV. MR. TEED.

Rev. Mr. Teed entered the Methodist ministry in the year of 1850, having been assigned to the Methodist Church at Guysboro, N. S. He remained there for one year only and then went to Margaree, B. C., also remaining there one year. The next two years of his life he spent at Sydney, N. S., and in 1859 was ordained at Fredericton at the conference of Eastern British America, which took in the whole of the Maritime Provinces. He was ordained by the late Rev. Matthew Ritchie, D. D. For the next three years he labored at Greenwood, N. S., going from there to Newfundland, where he remained four years preaching at three different churches in that time. Baie Verte was the next place Rev. Mr. Teed was called to and after remaining there for two years went to Fairville, when he remained a like time. He then went to Portland, N. B., then to Cheatham and Tryon, P. E. I., remaining three years in each place. Rev. Mr. Teed then returned to Bay Verte where he remained for three years and then accepted a call to Dorchester and after preaching at the first town for three years was superannuated and came to Moncton in 1891, since which time he has occasionally occupied pulpits in the city and surrounding districts. Rev. Mr. Teed was twice married, first in 1863 to Rachel Jane Haviland, daughter of the late Isaac Haviland, of Greenwood, N. S. He married his second wife in 1896, she being Adeline Pettman, daughter of the late Charles Pettman, Browns Plains, N. B. Four years ago Mr. Teed completed his fifty-fourth year with the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference and on that occasion was presented with an address by the Conference. For six years in succession, Rev. Mr. Teed was chairman of the Sackville and Prince Edward Island district and in 1883 he was elected president of the Conference.—Moncton Times.
