Fishing Schooner Race On If Contestants Will Abide By Rules

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 4.—Nova Scotia may defend the international trophy for fastest fishing schooner at Gloucester this year. Some arrangements can be made whereby the contestants will abide by the decisions made by the officials conducting the race, according to W. H. Dennis, author of the contest and donor of the cup.

Mr. Dennis when interviewed today said:

"There will likely be a fisherman's race this autumn if the entrants will undertake to abide by the decisions of the sailing committee in charge of the race. The importance of the fishing industry of an annual contest, but will not countenance a repetition of the controversies which marked the last two contests at Gloucester and Halifax. If the owners of the competing fishing schooners will agree to adhere to the rules laid for the contest as interpreted by the responsible officials the race will no doubt be on."

SINGLE G. IS EASY VICTOR

PREQUE ISLE, Me., Sept. 4.—Single G., the most famous pacer of all time, cleaned up in three straight heats the most famous pacer ever owned in Maine, John R. Braden, community-owned in Presque Isle, in a match race that drew 20,000 people to the Northern Maine fair this afternoon.

It was the first time in recent years that Braden ever trailed three times to the wire, but he was plainly outtraced by "the horse which time forgot." The admirers of John R. Braden claim that their horse was not in the pink of condition today, but many took the short end of long odds in the hope that something might happen.

Won First Easily.

Single G. drew the pole in the first heat and the veteran John Willard choose to trail behind all the way with Braden, saving him for a dash to the wire, and pulling the length of Single G. at the head of the stretch. It was a pretty dash, but Single G. appeared to have speed to spare and was a length to the good at the wire in the rather slow time of 2:07 1/4.

The second heat was the best, Willard changing his tactics and making it a wire to wire drive, outting for the pole on the first turn and holding a lead to the finish. Single G. was almost a length behind when they squared away for the wire and Ed. Allen had to shake out the famous old horse on the dash home, but he was there as of old not more than fifty from the wire let out a link that shot him ahead of Braden by nearly half a length under the wire in 2:06 3/4.

Braden Outtraced.

The third heat was about the same, although Willard was contented to keep the lead at a slightly slower gait and again Single G. outtraced him to the wire, this time by a length, in 2:08 3/4.

Nova Scotian Is Tenth On List Of Trapshooters

TORONTO, Sept. 4.—The second day's shoot of the Eastern Canada championships in the Canadian National Exhibition tournament, held at the traps of the Toronto Gun Club, drew a very large number of shooters and a large gallery of spectators yesterday. This shoot is the largest ever held in Canada.

The feature of the day was the second half of the Eastern Canada singles championships. G. S. Abbott, of St. Hubert's Gun Club, Ottawa, and Joe Jennings, Toronto Gun Club, were tied on the 200 targets, with scores of 189 each. The shoot off of twenty targets breaking 19. They shot twenty more in an endeavor to break the deadlock, but each broke twenty straight and were still tie.

Finally in the third twenty targets, Abbott defeated Jennings by one third, their score being 19 and 18 respectively, and Abbott was crowned the Eastern Canada singles champion, and receives a handsome gold medal.

Tenth in the scoring was J. E. McCowry, Nova Scotia, with 91 of a possible hundred.

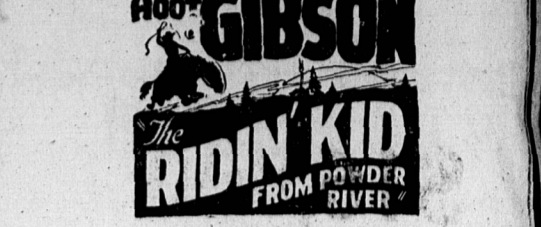
