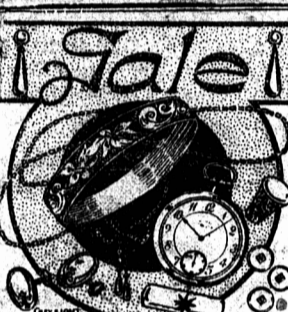

Continued from page 1. and referred to the Committee on Private Bills, which was done. The Order of the Day being taken up, Mr. Buntain moved that the House again resolve itself into committee to take into further consideration the bill to incorporate the town of Kensington. The House went into committee, with Mr. Doble as chairman, and further considered the bill, agreeing to a number of clauses, and then the chairman reported progress. REPORT ON BILLS.

The Committee on Private Bills then reported as follows: "Your Committee on Private Bills having had under consideration the following Bills, report that the said Bills are of a private nature and recommend the payment of the fees set opposite the names respectively: An Act to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Trust Co. .... \$205 An Act to incorporate the Sutherland Silver Black Fox Co. .... \$70 An Act to incorporate the O'Leary Silver Patch Fox Co. .... \$45

The report was adopted. The Premier then moved the adjournment of the House until Tuesday, March 31, at 3 p. m.

The Hon. Mr. Richards here rose and said he would like to ask the Leader of the Government, before the adjournment of the House when the public accounts were likely to be ready.

Mr. Mathieson: I think the question is a proper one. We have been urged forward the accounts with all possible speed, but owing to various circumstances the printers are more heavily engaged now than they have ever been in our experience in the past. The work, I am told, will be ready to-morrow, and if the Leader of the Opposition happens to be in town then I shall be very glad to give him an advance copy. I have been hoping to have the Budget Speech next week, but circumstances may make that impossible. In any event the accounts should be in the hands of the members in sufficient time to allow them to make a proper examination of them.

The Speaker then adjourned the House.

AROUND THE FOX EXCHANGES

The Fur Farmers' Bureau has just launched one of the biggest fox propositions yet floated. "Fur Producers Limited" is the name of the new concern, and it has an authorized capital of \$2,000,000. The amount of the issued capital at the present time, however, is \$1,000,000, but after the shareholders have realized 100 per cent, it will be the policy of the company to reserve ten pairs at least of each year's production in order to make up the total of 100 pairs of foxes and take up the whole of the authorized capital. The company propose to start business with fifty pairs of foxes. While the object of Fur Producers, Limited, will be to ranch, raise, buy and sell all kinds of fur-producing animals, for the present only pure-bred silver black foxes will be considered; but the business will be extended to raising mink, marten, otter, skunk, fisher, and karakule sheep, among other fur-bearers, when it is unquestionably demonstrated that the raising of these animals in captivity is profitable and beyond the experimental stage. Though the company has been incorporated in Nova Scotia, with its head office in Halifax, the foxes will be ranched on this island under the care of Mr. Frank Tuplin. The directorate of the Fur Producers, Ltd. are Messrs. J. H. Winfield, of Halifax, A. R. Kaufman, of Berlin, Ont., Walter H. Covert, K. C., and T. N. Goudge, of Halifax, F. T. Tuplin, of Summerside, Chester McLure and Walter S. Grant, of Charlottetown. The company has spared no pains in bringing itself before the public in regard to the issue of prospectuses. The prospectus which it has issued is an exceptionally well got-up and attractive booklet, profusely illustrated, stating facts regarding the industry which leave no doubt as to its genuineness and permanency and its attraction to the investor. Already a considerable portion of the capital of Fur Producers, Ltd. has been subscribed, not only in the Maritime Provinces but in Upper Canada as well.

A silver black fox company is being organized at St. Peter's with four pairs of highest grade silver black foxes. At a meeting on Thursday night, a considerable part of the capital was subscribed.

The Fur Farmers' Bureau contemplate carrying out this summer a heavy campaign in the free distribution of literature concerning the fox industry and its wonderful growth, which should be of the greatest value to the business.
