DEPUTATION WAITS UPON PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT

In Memoriam

MISS ANNIE NICHOLSON.

Miss Annie Nicholson of Caledonia, P. E. I., died at her home in Caledonia on Wednesday night, March 14th, 1928. She had been enjoying good health and on Wednesday morning was as well as usual. But in the evening of this same day she suddenly became unconscious and died about 10:30 P.M.

Miss Nicholson was born in this same home in Caledonia in 1858 and died at the age of 70. She is survived by one sister, Mrs. John MacLean, of Glen Martin, and one brother, William Nicholson, and a nephew, John Nicholson, who was living in his home with her. The brother just older than she, the late Angus Nicholson, died just two months ago, on January 22.

99 Clergymen Get O'Keefe Brewery Shares

SECOND VALUATION GIVES ONLY \$38.68 EACH—CARLING'S BREWERY MADE THE BEST OFFER, \$1,350,000, FOR SHARES.

(Toronto Telegram March 23.)

Holding Co., owned or controlled by O'Keefe's, Limited, which would be approximately 58 per cent of the outstanding shares of the Holding Company.

The best and last offer received was from brokers on behalf of Carling Breweries, Limited, August 19, 1927, a cash offer of \$1,350,000. Executives of the estate were willing to accept this price and did recommend acceptance. However, they did not control O'Keefe's, Limited, and were unable to enforce acceptance.

Had the offer been accepted, Mr. Sproat's affidavit continues, and the preferred shares of O'Keefe's Holding Co., Limited, with all arrears of dividends paid in full, it would have left for distribution amongst the common shareholders of O'Keefe's Holding Company, the sum of \$337,850. As there were 6,000 common shares of O'Keefe's, Limited, it meant that each common shareholder of O'Keefe's Holding Co., on 31st October, 1927, held by the company, was \$56.30 per share.

Frederick T. Walsh, secretary-treasurer of O'Keefe's Holding Co., and of O'Keefe's Beverages, states in an affidavit that the book value of the shares of the company as at October 31st, 1927, was \$38.68 per share. To ascertain the book value of the various assets, including a value of \$228,563 placed upon the goodwill of the business of the company. He deducted therefrom the outstanding liabilities other than the liability to shareholders. Then he deducted from the net assets the face value of the preferred shares and unpaid dividends to date, which left a balance of assets of the value of \$386,831.21 for distribution among the common shareholders of the company. There are 10,000 common shares of the par value of \$100 each outstanding, which makes the book value of each common share of the company outstanding, \$38.68.

Not Born Of Politics

St. John Telegraph-Journal says: The Duncan Report came under discussion in the debate following the opening of the Prince Edward Island Legislature, and Hon. J. D. Stewart, now leader of the Opposition, but who was Premier during the Maritime campaign which led to the appointment of the Duncan Commission, very forcibly reminded the House and the public that the movement for Maritime justice was not born of partisan politics. That is true, and all the more important because of the need that party politics shall be excluded in such further steps as may prove necessary to secure the full measure of justice. The way forward lies through non-partisan co-operation.

Hon. Mr. Stewart made it clear that he was not attempting to deprive Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King of any credit due him or his Government for such action as has been taken in implementing the Duncan recommendations, though he pointed out that the work is not yet complete. As to the origin and nature of the Maritime movement Hon. Mr. Stewart said:

"I want to say this: I have made the statement before on the floor of this House, and I wish to repeat it—that no political party, no Government, federal or provincial, can take any great amount of credit for the Duncan Report. Credit is due to people of the Maritime Provinces; it is due to the Boards of Trade, to other institutions and to public citizens of loyalty and devotion to their province—men who are in business and who saw the drift of these Maritime Provinces and felt that it was necessary that something must be done; those people became awake and undertook a campaign that spread all through these Maritime Provinces; and it spread to Ottawa and became so insistent there that it was borne in upon the Government, whether they liked it or not that it was necessary to their life that something should be done for these Provinces. That is the history of the birth of the Duncan Report.

Both parties in Parliament gave support to the Duncan recommendations, as did the country at large.

Fire Loss \$200,000

PORT WASHINGTON, N. Y., March 30.—Damage estimated at \$200,000 was caused by a fire which destroyed Harold Vanderbilt's luxurious mansion and a dozen speed boats belonging to wealthy persons here last night.
