THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., June 21. — Dullness was the chief characteristic of the export grain trade here today, there being little or no demand from outside sources. In sympathy with the renewed strength in the future market for corn at Chicago, prices for the cash article on spot were marked up one cent per bushel. A fair lot of American sample corn was quoted at \$1.05 1/2 and Argentine corn at \$1.05 1/2 per bushel. Canadian western oats ruled steady. Prices for all grades of spring wheat flour were well maintained but the volume of business was small. Business in winter wheat flour was rather more active than it has been of late and the undertone was firm. A fair amount of trade was done in all lines of millfeed and values were steady. The demand for standard grades of rolled oats was good and prices were unchanged. The egg market was moderately active and firm. The undertone was 45-48 cents. The undertone to the market for old crop potatoes continued easy today and another downward revision is expected in the near future. Car lots of Quebec white B grade were quoted at \$2.00 to \$2.15 per bag and reds at \$1.70 to \$1.80 per bag of 90 pounds, in bulk, ex-track. The spot butter market was without any feature to note, prices being steady under a very limited demand. The receipts were 2063 packages. The cheese trade turned and values were inclined to be heavy. Western grades were quoted at 18 cents to 18 1/2 cents per pound and

eastern grades at 17 1/2 cents per pound. The receipts were 1613 boxes.

OTTAWA, Ont. June 21. — Eggs — Canadian egg markets continue firm with no material changes reported today.

Toronto — This market is firm with dealers quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned, extras 31 to 33, firsts 28 to 30, seconds 24 to 26. A sale is reported of firsts and better at 32 f. o. b. Ontario shipping points cases returned. A car is offered from Manitoba at extras 32 1/2, firsts 30 1/2, seconds 27 f. o. b. but no sale is reported.

Montreal — This market is steady with dealers quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned extras 32 to 34, firsts 29 to 30, seconds 26 to 27.

Regina — Receipts here are light with dealers still quoting country shippers extras 26, firsts 24, seconds 19 delivered cases returned.

Edmonton — Receipts are holding up fairly well although quality is falling off.

Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 26, firsts 24, seconds 19 delivered cases returned.

Wholesalers are cutting prices to retailers to effect sales.

THE TOUCH OF TANG.

Many dishes are a bit insipid of themselves and need a flavor to help them out. Banana sauce or salad is improved by being mixed with sliced oranges. Let them stand awhile together and the banana has had time to absorb some of the flavor of the orange. Melons are more delicious if served with strips of lemon such as is offered with food tea or fish. Blueberries, huckleberries, blackberries, prunes and many other cooked fruits have a better flavor for the addition of lemon juice. The juice of the lemon seems to enhance or bring out the natural flavor of the fruit, and not change or counteract it.

Frostings, custards, rice puddings and baked apples etc. enriched by caramelizing the sugar used with them or by using brown sugar. Granulated white sugar is caramelized by being heated in a thick sauce pan until it is brown. It must be stirred constantly to keep it from burning. Cocoa or chocolate has a more delightful taste if a few drops of vanilla are added to it.
