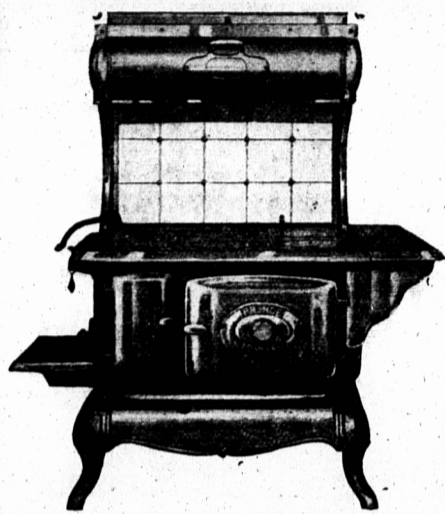

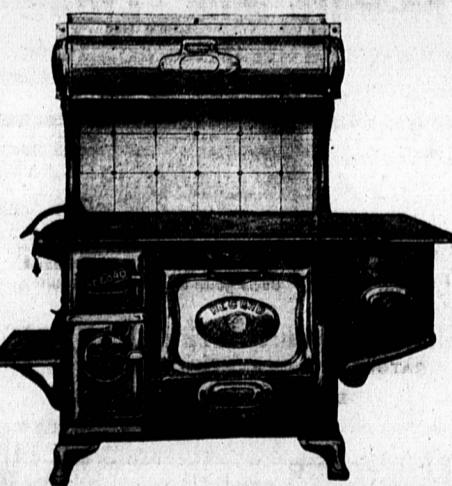
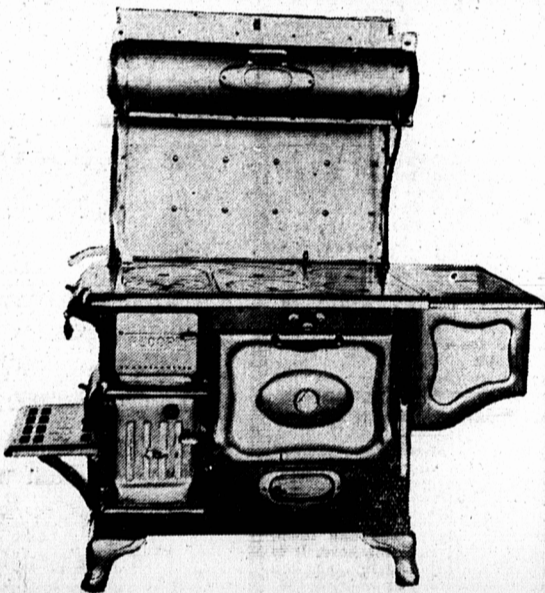

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. (CAPT.) DUNCAN MacDOUGALL

The death occurred at Newtown on Tuesday morning, Feb. 22nd, of Margaret Munn, wife of Capt. Duncan MacDougall. On the previous Thursday she was stricken with paralysis and although not able to speak she was fully conscious all the end.

The late Mrs. MacDougall was born in Wood Islands in 1861, and was therefore in her 66th year at the time of her demise. On January 12th, 1887 she married Capt. —SUCCESSFUL ISLANDER AT HOME.—We recently read about the many successful Islanders abroad, but do we ever read of the successful Islanders at home. Thirteen years ago Ezra Frasher fishersters at Campbell's Cove, a boat in which he fished that day comprised all his real wealth. When the fishing season was over he hauled up the boat in the shed and hid her goods as, so volatile, he would have no chance for her, for he intended to run up a country store at North Lake where he was born and bred. He procured from his father, Donald Fraser, a plot of land long-side the road, near the junction of the East Point and Elmira roads and started putting up a building for a store. Meantime Messrs Sterns Bros. of Souris had decided to start a store at this point, but as there would not be trade for two stores Mr. Fraser and the Messrs Sterns compromised by the former acting as manager for the Sterns Company while occupying Fraser's building, so Messrs Sterns did not build at all. For nineteen years Mr. Fraser acted as manager of this Sterns store at North Lake. Meantime business was good for the store is situated in the midst of a prosperous settlement and Mr. Fraser thought he was making long enough for others and decided to branch out for himself. He owned the building and lease was expired. He therefore proposed to the Messrs Sterns to purchase the goods in the store and carry on for himself. This he did nineteen years ago. Luck has evidently favored him. The store in the store now is about six times the meagre stock purchased from the Sterns Co. at the present time, to between \$25,000 and \$30,000. Everything called by the rural resident may be procured at the Fraser store. At a recent visit to this store the Guardian scribe, viewing the tremendous stock and how every bit and corner was crammed with goods remarked to Mr. Fraser that "if you own all this goods, if they are paid for, you are a pretty wealthy man." Mr. Fraser quickly answered, "Everything you see here is paid for and my own and you did not see all the stock in the warehouse," so there.
