LADY'S PROTEST RE MASSACRES

Arabs Strongly Attack Fort and are Repulsed

TRIPOLI, Nov. 8.—(By wire)—The Arabs, with artillery, vigorously attacked Fort Hamidieh at noon but were repulsed after a fight that lasted two hours.

SENTRY SYSTEM FOR NEW YORK POLICE

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Radical change in the method of policing the city is announced by Rhinelander Waldo, police commissioner. The proposed plan embraces the division of each precinct into from ten to twelve sections, with a squad of policemen covering designated posts in each section under direct supervision of a section chief.

NEW QUEBEC HOSPITAL

QUEBEC, Nov. 7.—At a meeting of the Provincial Cabinet, held this morning it was decided to grant a subsidy of \$3,500 towards the erection of a Tuberculosis Hospital in the city of Quebec.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—(By wire)—Mr. Balfour has resigned the leadership of the Opposition.

CARNEGIE IS LORD RECTOR OF ABERDEEN UNIVERSITY

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Andrew Carnegie has been duly elected as Premier Asquith's successor as lord rector of Aberdeen university.

For some time Carnegie had been regarded in academic circles as the prospective rector, but at the nomination meeting last week, a lively affair, there was a sort of bolt from the blue.

WHITNEY DISDAINFUL OF ROWELL'S ADDRESS

TORONTO, Nov. 7.—When asked if he would comment on N. W. Rowell's address to the electors, Sir James Whitney said: "It is almost too soon for me to say anything about the remarkable utterance of Mr. Rowell. In fact I have not yet read it carefully and, therefore, cannot go into details."

PHILA. EDITOR DEAD

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 7.—Dr. Alfred C. Lamin, editor of the Public Ledger for the past twelve years and previously managing editor of the Philadelphia Times, died today of heart disease. He was 65 years of age. He was well known as a writer on musical and art topics.

KINGSTON, Jam., Nov. 8.—Tribune Saint Juste, formerly Haitian Consul-General here, has issued a manifesto in the local press in which he declares himself the leader of the Liberal party in Haiti and expresses his determination to return to that country and overthrow the government of President Leconte, who he brands as a scoundrel.

R. L. STEVENSON'S LETTERS IMPOUNDED

NEW ISLAND HAS AREA OF 3 ACRES

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Nov. 7.—The new island which appeared in this vicinity the other day is about three acres in extent, rising out of the water to a height of from eight to ten feet. Before the upheaval the depth of water at this spot averaged about twenty feet.

MENTALLY UNFIT TO STAND TRIAL

SAARNIA, Ont., Nov. 7.—Wm. James Moore, the slayer of Mrs. Mary King in Petrolia last summer, was declared by a jury at the Assize Court yesterday to be mentally unfit to stand or to face trial and he was committed to jail by Justice Britton to await the outcome of the disease from which he is suffering. Should he at anytime recover he will be brought to trial.

SHIPPING NEWS FROM BOSTON

BOSTON, November 6.—Only five fishing vessels docked at T wharf yesterday, but a number of others are expected in this morning. The catch of the beam trawler Ripple, which came in at dark, was not obtained. The other vessels arriving in were the Regina, with 60,000 pounds of fish; the M. St. Greer, with 60,000 pounds; Ellen C. Burke, with 30,000 pounds; and the Georgia, with 35,000 pounds of mixed fish.

WILL HONOR BIRTHDAY OF LIBERAL CHIEF

OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier's seventieth birthday on Monday the 20th instant, will be fittingly marked by the Liberal members of Parliament. A suggestion that the day be made the occasion of a renewed expression of the affection and esteem of Liberals for their leader has been enthusiastically endorsed in Ottawa and will doubtless be welcomed by every Liberal member of the Commons and Senate.

DUKE BROKE IN ON THE HOUSE CLEANING

OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught paid his first visit to the Senate and House of Commons today under rather unattractive circumstances. Accompanied by two of his aides he strolled into the Parliament Building about noon. There was not even a messenger on duty to do the honors of the occasion. The house cleaning process Parliament next week was in full swing. Corridors were in semi-darkness, and paint and floor sweepings were in evidence. His Royal Highness and aides who had to find their own way about must have had a rather unfortunate first impression of the Capital's chief show place.

LET HIM CHAMP

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The Evening Globe says: "Only an entirely false estimate of Champ Clark's real position among his own countrymen could cause an Englishman or Canadian to feel even annoyance at his latest attack of the vapors. It is a pity his hot-air was noticed in the Commons. We can afford to let him Champ."

THIRTY KILLED

CUATLA, Mex., Nov. 6.—Thirty Zapatistas were killed today in a counter with Federals, who had been sent to dislodge the Rebels from the Hacienda Coido. The Federal loss is not reported.

RIDPATH IMPROVES

TORONTO, November 7.—Bruce Ridpath's condition was apparently slightly improved this morning. He now has frequent intervals of semi-consciousness. His physicians are more hopeful of his recovery.
