REV. MR. WADMAN'S lecture on Japan, given in Grace church last night, was one of rare interest. Mr. Wadman was dressed in Japanese costume, in a suit pre-arranged to him by his congregation shortly before leaving for America. His was a plain, unaffected talk and notwithstanding that he spoke for an hour and a half the interest of his audience never waned. He is a speaker of exceptionally pleasing cadence and is possessed of a large degree of personal magnetism. In speaking of the different routes to the Eastern Empire he lauded very highly the passenger accommodations on the C. P. R. The climate, soil and natural resources of Japan the social habits of the people, their intelligence, patriotism and peculiar traits, the points of interest in and around Tokio, the beautiful mountain scenery, the oft recurring earthquakes;—all these and several other topics were dwelt upon in a humorous and exceedingly interesting manner. In conclusion he spoke of the advancement of christianity in that kingdom during the past 25 years, pointing out that the people have now largely abandoned the old superstitions and idolatrous customs, and having founded many of their institutions after European methods, the great requisite to Japan's future success is the shedding of the light of Christianity among the masses of her people. This neglected, her future is almost inevitably one of agnosticism and infidelity. Mr. Wadman exhibited a number of Japanese curios, to all of which he made interesting reference. He will give another lecture in the basement of the First Methodist church Wednesday evening.

DELIGHTFUL TIMES.—Very often we see matter published in the press and elsewhere about worldly enjoyments, and called good times. And why not say something about spiritual good times? As it happened I have been to Granville at the communion season, and learning and seeing something grand as we travelled over hills and valleys which I never have travelled before. The vocal music was a foretaste of the songs of Zion, and far beyond the sound of praises made by machinery. Long may the Rev. gentleman live who has uttered and spoken from his pulpit that the singing was better than the sound of one hundred organs. We wish the Rev. gentlemen long life and power in their field of labor, and strength to raise their voices against all idolatry. A few days ago a great committee was convened in the Province of Quebec to

settle worldly grievances this is useful in its way. How much more is it needed in the Christian advancement of God's cause, to visit where grievances are and to bear with them the spirit of St. Paul who says "If meat make my brother to offend I will eat no flesh while the world standeth lest I make my brother to offend," and obey the command that says "Persuade them to come in," so that Granville good times may be felt elsewhere."—OBSERVER.
