Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole heir of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but a Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$3.00. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

ENJOY ENGLISH LIFE

The following letter has been received by Miss Mary A. McKinnon, Lewes Lot 60 from her brother G. Alexander who is in Shorncliffe, England.

Shorncliffe, England.
March 28th 1916.

Dear Sister:—Received your welcome letter some time ago, was delighted to hear from home and to hear that you are all well. I am in the best of health and feeling fine. I started to write a few times but we expected to go back to Horsham as we have been here quite a while now, that is— all the overstrength of the battery which is about \$5 of us. The 98th Battery is at Horsham yet, they expect to go to Lydd to finish their training but I believe they are quarantined with measles which is very prevalent there.

When we came down here we expected to go to France but we cannot go just now as we are sent back to Horsham to train and reinforce our own battery. We would rather stay here and go to the front from here as we are all anxious to go over there now.

This country is very fine at present except for some rainy days. We had a little snow here for about a week but it is getting summer-like once more, we have a better time here than we would have in Canada. There are men arriving here from our own country quite often. When does the 105th Battalion expect to come over? I am sending you some pictures and have more if you want them. I received the socks O. K., some time ago. Hoping to hear from you soon. Kindest regards to you all. Put the old address on any letter as I will be back by the time any answer to this arrives. Good-bye, from your loving brother, ALEXANDER.
