The following is the address: Kingston, P. E. I. January 14, 1947.

We can count on you now in our time of war in wartime in this we are confident.

Your valuable contribution to our country's welfare is ever worthy of note and so as a remembrance of our thanks and appreciation we present this small gift, may the future be one of prosperity and happiness for you.

Lenten Meditations

From The Times, London

DUTY AND DESIRE Many people whose Christianity is genuine enough are uneasy at heart over their private devotion.

They seldom fail to "say their prayers" because they recognize their duty laid upon them by their religion, and it may be one which they have unconsciously, as a habit, and it may be one which has accustomed them to perform.

Yet they cannot honestly say that the time spent in prayer brings them great happiness, or that they look forward keenly to these minutes as the best part of the day.

Perhaps there is no better cure for such misgivings than to study St. Paul's philosophy of prayer, as he states it in the eighth chapter of Romans. In the eighth chapter of Romans, the source of prayer is human power set in motion by the human will.

Whether the spirit abstains from praying depends upon his own volition. But if he does pray, St. Paul argues, he brings into action, perhaps unconsciously, a power dwelling within him which is more than human.

The divine Spirit is present within him, praying with him and for him. This is the "found conception" as Professor Dods terms it in his admirable summary of the Pauline doctrine.

"of prayer as the divine in us appealing to the God above us." It set forth in two verses which, in modern idiom, may be paraphrased: "The Spirit helps us in our weakness, for we do not know how to pray aright. But the Spirit within us intercedes for us with an intensity that goes beyond all human speech, and God who reads the human heart knows also what is in the mind of the Spirit, who prays for God's people."

The prayer which the divine Spirit intercedes in man, therefore, is not a petition and ascends to the transcendent God who is above man. It is a prayer which is understood and accepted, obviously, by God.

The Christian may still be formal or defective in his prayers, a hundred ways. Yet how little, relatively, this will seem to matter, if by the very nature of the thing, the divine Spirit is at work, forcing his feeble petitions, asking for all those things which his human ignorance or more failures have caused him to ignore.

In Memoriam JOHN E. FRASER On Tuesday, January 7th, 1947, he passed away at his home in Montague, P. E. I., a revered and honored man in the person of John E. Fraser. He was the son of the late Charles B. and Hannah Fraser, and was born in Montague, where he lived his entire life.

He was in his 67th year. After only a few days of slight indisposition, he passed away suddenly. Mr. Fraser was highly respected by the entire community. Half Million Men Served at Canteen

At the recent Annual Meeting of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Canadian Legion, Mrs. Allan Cosh, Convener for the Auxiliary Canteen Committee, gave some interesting and amazing statistics concerning the work done by the Canteen from May, 1942 to August 1946, during which time the Auxiliary gave voluntary service with the exception of only one salaried worker.

As many as 65 volunteers per week worked in 3 shifts each day from 9 P. M. to 12 P. M. Attention should be drawn to the appended report to the grand total of 514,830 men of the forces served in the Canteen, where prices were low and sandwiches, tea, coffee and cake of the highest quality.

Reinforcing doses are administered when required to school children immunized three or more years ago.
