DEBATE ON ADDRESS CONTINUED BY HON. A. E. ARSENAULT

(continued from page one)

brought on. The time would come when the House would appoint a committee unless the Leader of the Opposition wanted to take the responsibility of making a charge; but even if his courage failed him, and he had no doubt it did—the government would take the initiative in the matter. **MR. BELL:** I issued the challenge.

HON. MR. ARSENAULT: But you did not make the charge and you have not the courage, you have not the manhood to stand up in your place and make it on your responsibility as a member. And moreover you can't prove it.
Continuing, Mr Arsenault said he had no doubt that but for the Leader of the Opposition and his myrmidons the affidavit would never have been made. As the hour for closing had arrived, Mr Arsenault moved the adjournment of the debate.

SATURDAY, APRIL 1.

The House met at 10.50 a. m., with Mr. Speaker Martin in the chair.

A number of questions were in the orders of the day, but the Premier pointed out that it was not customary to bring down papers until the address had been disposed of, and Mr. Hughes assenting, the questions were held over.

Mr. Hughes called attention to the fact that there were still two dop-keepers to be appointed, and said he had a list of returned soldiers which he would like to submit to the govern-

ment from which to make selections. The Premier said they had already appointed one soldier to one of the two vacancies, but the other had still to be filled. It was a delicate matter making a selection and he suggested that the matter be taken up after the journal on Tuesday. Mr. Hughes assented to this course.

DEBATE RESUMED.

Hon. A. E. Arsenault resumed his speech on the address. He said there was one question which had been asked by the various Opposition speakers which he would like to touch upon, viz., What was the reason of the reduced majority of the Government? There were various explanations given by the Opposition that they were dissatisfied with the record of the Government was one of them. He had met in the course of the recent campaign both in his own districts and in others independent Liberals who were greatly pleased with the legislation of the Government, with the work on the roads and with the finances, so much so that some Liberals of substance voted for the Government candidates. If they were to seek for an explanation let them look back at the past histories of politics here and they would find that last election was just an instance of history repeating itself. The Sullivan Government was returned by a great majority, and when it made its first appeal to the country was returned 16-14. In 1903, Premier Peters who had enjoyed a large majority, was returned 16-14. It was sometimes the natural result of the pendulum swinging too far. People were tired and disgusted with the Liberal Government and were determined upon a change. Then there was the change of Governments at Ottawa, and many people were of opinion that the local government should be of the same complexion as the Ottawa government. Many Liberals, therefore, voted for the conservatives or stayed at home rather than risk a return of the late government. They knew that in this province, parties are pretty evenly divided, the property vote being largely Liberal and it was that that had given such a number to the Opposition to-day. They had a state of affairs in the dual representation in the one Chamber which had not its equal in another province, and it might be well for that House to give this matter its consideration. When a party had been out of power for 20 years and then obtained power there were many office seekers and they could not all get positions. They knew they had in their ranks at last election a number of dissatisfied office seekers and others who were dissatisfied because both the Dominion and local governments had retained in office Liberals who had been disappointed by their predecessors. They had

been retained because they had proved good and faithful servants, and that it would be wrong to turn them out of their positions without cause other than a change of government. But all the members of the party did not think as they thought, and some of these became dissatisfied and were persuaded by Liberal Candidates to vote against the Government. Then there was a sentiment in the country that there should be a stronger opposition; and it was well known that Liberal candidates who had little prospect of being returned otherwise, went to conservative electors and said: "Vote for us, the Government is all right, but you will have a better government if you have a stronger opposition." Others said: "We have not a chance of being returned, but vote for us and reduce our opponents majority." Both these had their effect on the voters. Then there was the campaign of slander and misrepresentation to which he had referred. They were prepared to show up some of these methods later, their opponents went on the principle of throwing mud
