

PROVINCIALIST IS KILLED

The C. P. R. Carberry, Manitoba yard was the scene of another fatal railway accident on Wednesday night Oct 11th, when one of the employees lost his life. The work train of the double tracking gang which had been here for a few days was making preparation to pull west to Twell and had backed down to the water tank for water. The tail end of the train was about a car length over the east switch and was unprotected. The way freight from the East approached at a good rate of speed crashed into the end of the standing train. A flat car on the end of the work train was driven right through a box car which was used as an office by the timekeeper and at the time occupied by him, whose name appears to be Reginald Milford Roberts.

The above tells the story of how a young life was snuffed out at 9 o'clock on Wednesday night, when the whole town was startled by a terrific crash. A large crowd soon gathered at the scene of the accident, and it was some time before anyone realized that there was a human being buried in the debris. A colored man with the work train, however, was busy trying to locate the timekeeper, and not being able to find him around the town concluded he must have been in his car. The search then started in earnest and in a few minutes the dead body of the unfortunate man was found in a lying position. It is supposed that after completing his reports for the day's work he lay down on a bed which was in the car. The body was soon removed, and the three town doctors on the scene, but nothing could be done, life being extinct. The body was removed to Davy's Undertaking Parlor awaiting instructions for burial. From a pass book which was on his person it was found that his

father lived at Marengo, Sask. and also a sister, H. L. Roberts at Beulah, Manitoba, to whom messages were immediately forwarded by C. P. R. officials. Roadmaster Megruid, who is with the work train, speaking of the deceased to the News-Express said: "Roberts has been with me for two years in the building of the double track from Marquette, West. He was a sober, industrious and careful clerk, and always had his work up to the minute." Together the road-master and Roberts pumped the velocipede into Carberry on the evening of the accident, reaching here at 6.30 p. m. They both went for supper after which the timekeeper said he would go and make his report of the day. Rev. W. C. Murdock Beulah, brother-in-law, man, and Miss Hazel L. Roberts, sister of the deceased, took the remains to Marengo, Sask, for interment. (Other papers please copy.) (Deceased was son of Josiah Roberts whose former home was in Murray Harbor, P. E. I. The large number of people who viewed her remains and bent at her casket to offer a prayer for her departed soul was ample evidence of how she was respected. It was a consolation to her family and friends to have her nephew the Rev. Dr. Smith of St. Dunstan's College recite the Rosary and prayers for the departed over her remains and also the presence of Rev. Maurice McDohall of the Palace staff to join in the responses and who had driven

all the way from Charlottetown to pay his very honored respect to one whom he would never fail to pay a visit to when occasion would happen to bring him to Kelly's Cross, his native birth-place. Her funeral to Kelly's Cross on Friday the 27th inst was very largely attended, mass for the repose of her soul being sung by the Rev. Dr. Curran and from whom she received the last rites of her Holy Religion. The services at the grave were performed by the Rev. Dr. Curran assisted by the Rev. Dr. Smith. The pall bearers were grand children of the deceased—John, James and Wm. Callaghan of Charlottetown, John Keefe of Kinkora, John A. Coady and Philip Monaghan of Kelly's Cross. The driver of the horse was also a grand-child Philip Monaghan of Kinkora. She leaves to mourn a family of nine children, three of them having pre-deceased her. Ambrose of Kinkora, Francis of Kelly's Cross, James R. of the homestead South Melville, and Patrick of Providence, R. I. Mrs. P. Callaghan of Emyvale, Mrs. Hugh Campbell of Westmoreland and Mrs. Bernard Smith of Emerald, also fifty-eight grand-children and thirteen great grand-children besides a large circle of other relatives and friends who will ever cherish the memory of a good kind, true and devoted Christian woman. May her soul rest in peace.

MORE DYNAMITE FOUND ON TRACKS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 28—Southern Pacific Railroad officials here were notified yesterday, of the finding of thirty-six sticks of dynamite in a frog on the track at Ellwood, California, a few moments after train No. 18, a southbound passenger, had passed the switch. Part of the dynamite was pulverized, evidently having been ground by the car wheels. The dynamite was found within a few miles of the bridge where a similar cache was planted when President Taft's train passed, on Oct. 17th.

TORONTO, Oct. 30—Sir Donald Mann became seriously ill with an acute attack of indigestion on his private car, which left Montreal on the Canadian Pacific Railroad line on Thursday night and arrived in Toronto-Friday morning. Sir Donald's doctor here having been wired to meet the train when it arrived at the Union Station with a specialist, examined the railway magnate on his private car. Sir Donald's motor car was waiting for him at the entrance to the station, and when the doctors had finished their examination, the patient was assisted from the car to his machine. Without delay he was driven to his residence at Scarborough Cliff Park. He is now reported much better.

WHITNEY FIXES DATE OF THE POLLING.

TORONTO, Oct. 30—The Ontario Provincial elections will take place on Monday, November 11th., with nominations a week earlier. Sir James Whitney in announcing the date today issued a manifesto dealing with the record of the Government. The most striking declaration is the decision to create the portfolio of Minister of Power, which in the event of the success of the Conservatives at the polls, will go to Hon. Adam Beck of London, Ontario, who is now a Minister without a portfolio. The success of the Government's power policy has already been assured by the announcement that a profit of \$85,000 was made the first year.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS A person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each six years from date of homestead entry including the time required to survey homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre.—Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00. W. W.
