## IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JOHN FISHER

The death angel came to Cambridge Road, Lot 63, on the 19th ult., and removed therefrom one of the old land marks of that community, namely, Ellen (Miller), relict of the late John Fisher. The deceased had passed the 70th milestone of her life, and was in her usual good health until about seven or eight weeks before her death. Three daughters, Lucy, Ellen and Mary, and two sons, William and James survive her. Two sons Edward and Herbert predeceased their mother. The late Mrs. Fisher was a quiet, industrious and peaceful neighbor, a devoted wife and mother, and a respected and worthy Christian citizen, who had not a word of complaint to say of any one. During the last decade of her life and even for a longer period, she had a great deal of domestic affliction in her home, and yet she bore it all with genuine patience and in a calm and submissive Christian spirit. Her husband, who had predeceased her some 19 years ago became mentally afflicted before his death; her son Herbert, upon whom she leaned for support and whom she hoped would be the prop and stay of their home in the closing years of her life, died about three years ago. Her son James has been mentally afflicted by times for some years past. After Herbert's death, Mrs. Elias Acorn, (her daughter Mary) and her husband, lived in the home with her mother until about the end of June last, when Mrs. Acorn became mentally deranged and had to be removed to Falconwood asylum, where she is seriously ill. Her derangement began a few days after the birth of her first born child. The shock of her daughter's mental illness and of her removal to Falconwood, together with James' affliction (for the two are in Falconwood), was so severe that the mother seemed heart broken. She became suddenly ill, and was immediately taken to the home of her daughter (Lucy), Mrs. Edward Kerwin, where she was tenderly and lovingly ministered to all through her last illness by Mr. and Mrs. Kerwin and family. Her son William of City Mills, Mass., spent a few days with his mother shortly before her death, and her daughter, Mrs. Hudson Lewellyn was often by her bedside. Her funeral was largely attended, for many relatives and neighbors and acquaintances came to pay a farewell tribute of respect to the departed, and all seemed deeply moved with heartfelt sympathy for the family bereaved.  
The burial services were conducted by the late pastor, Rev. A. Gray, in the Murray Harbor North Cemetery, her mortal remains were laid to rest, by the side of loved ones gone before.

In loving memory of Miss Mary Hetherige who died at Charlottetown on Friday, Sept. 19, 1913, aged 15 years and nine months, beloved daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Hetherige. ## CONGREGATIONALISTS HOLD CONVENTION

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 21.—All arrangements have been completed for the reception and entertainment of the delegates to the triennial session of the National Council of Congregational Churches, which commences here tomorrow. The delegates include many of the divines, educators and business men of the country. There are also delegates from Canada, Australia and Great Britain, together with missionaries of the denomination from all parts of the pagan world. Talks with the delegates already on the field give abundant evidence of a general expectation that the convention is destined to be the most important in the history of the church.

A new constitution, containing a new statement of doctrine, will be one of the first and principal matters to be considered by the National Council. If the constitution, to be voted on, is adopted by the Council, which thus far has been purely an administrative body, will have its powers vastly increased. The constitution to be presented to the convention has been in process of construction for several years. The final draft, composed by a commission of nineteen members of the Council, contains the following statement of doctrine, which is understood to be an adequate expression of the Congregational faith.

"We believe in God, the Father, infinite in wisdom, goodness and love and in Jesus Christ, His Son, Our Lord and Savior, who for us and our salvation lived and died, and liveth evermore; and in the Holy Spirit, who taketh of the things of Christ and revealeth them to us, renewing, comforting and inspiring the souls of men.

"We are united in striving to know the will of God as taught in the Holy Scriptures, and in our purpose to walk in the ways made known or to be made known to us. We hold it to Christ to proclaim the Gospel of all Christ to proclaim the Gospel to all mankind, exalting the worship of the one true God and laboring for the progress of knowledge, the promotion of justice, the triumph of peace, and the realization of human brotherhood.

"Depending, as did our fathers, upon the continued guidance of the Holy Spirit to lead us into all truth, we work and pray for the transformation of the world into the Kingdom of God, and we look with faith for

the triumph of righteousness and for life and glory everlasting. Amen." It is proposed to create a secretary of the Council with large advisory powers. A committee to transact the business of the denomination between sittings of the Council is to be considered. This committee, it is said, will not trespass on the authority of the local church. A commission of missions is proposed to consider some method for an effective supervision of the six denominational benevolences. Another question of moment to be considered at this gathering is that of theological seminaries. Congregationalists have at present but three seminaries for the training of their ministers in traditional ways, at Atlanta, Ga., Bangor, Me., and Chicago. An effort may be made to start a movement for the establishment of one or more additional seminaries. Another question which may cause considerable discussion is the proposition of holding the meetings of the National Council every two years, instead of every three years as it has been customary.

Much interest is manifested in the coming election of a moderator and a secretary of the National Council. There are several candidates for each office and the outcome of the election is awaited with considerable interest by Congregationalists throughout the country. Among the principal candidates for the moderatorship are President Henry Churchill King, of Oberlin College, former Mayor of D. Percy Jones of Minneapolis, Minn.; the Rev. Dr. Charles S. Mills of Montclair, N. J.; Governor Baldwin of Connecticut and the Rev. Dr. Samuel H. Woodrow, now president of the Congregational Home Missionary Society.

The principal candidates mentioned for the secretaryship are the Rev. Dr. W. H. Day, pastor of the First Church of Los Angeles, Calif.; the Rev. Dr. William L. Barton of Chicago, now active in Congregational journalism; the Rev. Dr. Edward Lincoln Smith, lately of Seattle, but now with the American board, and the Rev. Dr. Hubert C. Hering of the Home Missionary Society.

The office of secretary, which is important if some proposed changes in the constitution are made, because under the new plan the powers of the secretary will be greatly enlarged and he will be made chairman of the proposed missions commission.
