NATIONAL DIVISION CHARTER FOR NEW ZEALAND.

Following the last session of the National Division I officially notified the Grand Scribe of the Grand Division of New Zealand, that the application for their Charter had been granted, by an unanimous vote of this National Division, and asked the Grand Scribe to forward to me the christian name of each applicant for insertion in the new Charter. Early in October I received a letter from W. U. Seed, G. S., informing me that he had received a communication from Brother Thomas Caswell, P. M. W. P., notifying him of the action of the National Division, also giving the initial names of the applicants.

I waited for a reply to my own communication, as the list furnished me gave the christian name of only one applicant.

In November, the form of the Charter was approved by the M. W. P., and after its engrossment, it was signed and forwarded.

I also sent copies of the private work of the Order, by registered package. No reply has been received to my several communications.

INCOMPLETE RETURNS.

Each year the Returns giving the detail of the work of the Order come in the different jurisdictions becomes less satisfactory. Seven of the twenty Grand Divisions reporting this year omit to send any detailed report, and eight of the thirteen returns are very indefinite.

The return from Nova Scotia is a model one in every particular and if our largest Grand Division can give their work for each year in full, it would seem possible for the other Grand Divisions to do so. With three-fourths of the Grand Divisions neglecting to report, a summary of the same would be misleading and fail to give even an approximate statement of the actual work performed. Either the legislation that require these statistics should be repealed or the executive officers of the several Grand Divisions should furnish the details. There are also inaccuracies as well as incompleteness in the returns.

"STOP THIEF!"

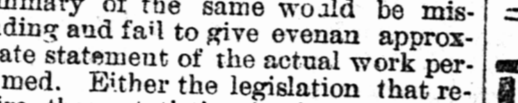
It is an old trick among the light-fingered fraternity to divert attention from themselves by raising the cry of "stop thief" and so putting the public on a false scent.

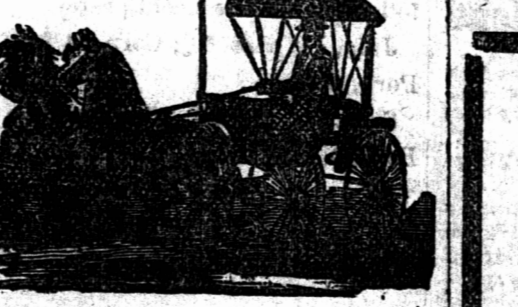
