Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age may homestead certain areas of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must apply in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Following is a letter of sympathy received by Mr. Elliot Bruce on the death of his brother Walter, who died on board ship on way to England to join the British Navy: Orman L. O. L., No. 2286, Kingsboro, P. E. I., March 12th, 1917.

To Brother Elliot Bruce—We your brother of Orman Lodge, No. 2286, would tender your ear heartfelt sympathies in the loss of your brother Walter Bruce, who enlisted for the defence of his king and country and died on board ship on his way to England to join the British Navy and was buried in a sailor's grave in the North Atlantic.

Though he never had the privilege of meeting the foe, yet he did his part manfully and voluntarily and died a hero as much as those who manned old England's wooden walls in the days of Nelson, or those who went down in the mighty dreadnoughts in the battle of Jutland. Again we assure you of our sympathies in your bereavement, and rest assured that, though gone, he is not forgotten.

A HERO'S LETTER.

When Lord Glenconners' son, the Hon. Edward Wyndham, Tenant of the Grenadier Guards was killed, some extracts were given from his last letter to his mother, which aroused a great deal of interest. We are now able to reproduce the whole of the letter, copies of which were given out to the congregation at the memorial service held at St. Margaret's Westminster. "It will be generally admitted that it is one of the finest spirited letters written by any lad who is or has been engaged in the war—From the Border Telegraph, Scotland.

France, Sept. 20, 1916.

"Tonight we go to the last trench we were in, and tomorrow or the next day we go over the top. Our brigade has suffered less than either of the two brigades in Friday's bit of the 15th, so we shall be in the forefront of the battle. I am full of hope and trust, and I pray that I may be worthy of my fighting ancestors. The one I know best is Sir Henry Wyndham, whose bust is in the hall at 44 Tielgrave square, and there is another picture on the stairs at 34 Queen Anne's Gate.

"We shall probably attack over 1,200 yards, but we shall have such artillery supports as will probably smash the line we are going for, and even if the artillery doesn't come up to our hopes (which is very unlikely) the spirit of the brigade of guards will carry all resistance before it.

"Oh, darling mother, the pride of being in so great a regiment; the thought that all the old men (late Grenadier Guards who sit in London clubs are thinking and hoping about what we are doing here now.) I have never been prouder of anything, except your love for me, than that I am a Grenadier. That line of Harry's rings through my mind. "High heart, high speech, high deeds, mild honoring eyes."

"I went to service on the hill this morning and took the Holy Communion afterwards, which always seems to help one a top, doesn't it?

"I slept like a top all night, and dreamed that someone I knew very well, but I can't remember who it was, came and told me how much I had grown. I felt rather like saying, "If it be possible, let this cup pass from me," but the triumphant finish, "Nevertheless, not what I will but Thy will," steals my heart and sends me into this battle with a heart of triple bronze. I always carry four photos of you when I go into action one in my note case, two in my leather book, and one around my neck.

"Pratt" farewell to Cassius sounds in my heart; "If not farewell, and if we meet again, we shall smile."

"Your love for me, and my love for you have made my life one of the happiest that has ever been.

"This is a great day for me. "God bless you and give you peace. "Now all my blessings go with you always—

"And with all we love. "Eternal love. "From B. I. M."
