EGG LAYING CONTEST

Notes on the P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest for the 21st week of the Contest, Ending March 27, 1925

The P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest made a gain of 62 eggs for the 21st week over the production of the previous week. There were only 6 hens that did not contribute to the grand total. There were 10 birds that laid every day in the week. The total number of eggs laid to date is 11,378; this was 831 eggs more than at the same date last year.

Mr. Walter Buntain's Barred Rocks led for the week with 57 eggs; Mrs. Fred McIntyre's White Leghorns tied with the Barred Rocks of Mr. W. G. McDonald and those of Mr. Joseph Carmichael for 2nd place with 56 eggs each; Mr. A. Wisner's White Wyandottes were third, with 55 eggs; Mr. Spurgeon Jenkins' Barred Rocks were fourth, with 53 eggs; Mr. G. F. Connors' White Leghorns tied with Mr. Sam McPherson's White Leghorns for 5th place, with 50 eggs each; Mr. Charles Parker's Barred Rocks tied with the Experimental Station's Barred Rocks for 6th place with 48 eggs each; Mr. Everett Howatt's White Leghorns were 7th, with 47 eggs; Mr. Edward Bulpitt's White Leghorn pen No. 3 tied with Mr. Harry Hyde's Barred Rocks for 8th place with 48 eggs.

Mr. G. F. Connors' White Leghorns lead the contest to date, with 778 eggs; Mr. Sam McPherson's White Leghorns are 2nd, with 738 eggs; Mr. Edward Bulpitt's White Leghorn pen No. 4 is third, with 752 eggs; Mr. Edward Bulpitt's White Leghorn pen No. 3 is fourth, with 686 eggs; Mr. A. Wisner's White Wyandottes are 5th, with 679 eggs; Mr. Joseph Carmichael's Barred Rocks are 6th, with 668 eggs; Mr. Walter Buntain's Barred Rocks are 7th, with 665 eggs; Mrs. Fred McIntyre's White Leghorns are 8th, with 618 eggs; Mr. W. W. Mutch's Barred Rocks are 9th, with 611 eggs; and Mr. Charles McKenna's Barred Rocks are 10th, with 581 eggs.

Mr. Charles McKenna's Pen No. 208 leads the contest with 101 eggs; Mr. Edward Bulpitt's Hens Nos. 42 and 45 are 2nd and 3rd, with 99 and 97 eggs respectively; Mr. McKenna's Hen No. 203 tied with the Experimental Farm's Hen No. 81 for 4th place with 94 eggs; Mr. G. F. Connors' Hen No. 61 tied with Mr. Buntain's Hen No. 200 for 7th place with 92 eggs each.

The Contest production during the week was 69%.

Mr. McNevin was a man who was widely and favourably known throughout the whole countryside. He was of a quiet unassuming nature and took very little part in the affairs of public life but was much admired by all who came to know him and while he will be much missed in the different spheres of life, it is in the home that his loss will be most keenly felt. His loved ones will henceforth long in vain for his gentle spirit. When the end came his faith never wavered. He passed away in the full assurance of that immortal hope believing that when the earthly house of this tabernacle had been dissolved there was awaiting him that house not made with hands eternal in the heavens.

PATRICK WELLINGTON GOODWIN

Patrick Wellington Goodwin, son of Daniel W. and S. Catherine Goodwin, Kensington, died in Calgary, Alberta on March 25th, 1925. This brilliant young man was born in Kensington on July 24th 1902, and early in life, displayed the possession of superior intellectual endowments. He received his primary education in Kensington High School and exhibited such remarkable ability that he commanded the attention of all his teachers. Passing up to the higher grades in this eminent seat of learning he gave evidence of a precocious aptitude to receive and assimilate knowledge and his parents, realizing how important it is that the growth and development of intellect be carefully guarded, entered him at St. Dunstan's University in the year nineteen hundred and sixteen. Here he followed the full University course with gratifying success. In his fifth year, he sustained a reverse consequent upon ill health, and thus was forced to discontinue. He sought means to recuperate and, for a space was able to perform light work.

In 1921 he was appointed census enumerator and this work he performed with absolute exactitude. The following year he resumed his educational course, taking six months' rest and last year work and graduating with the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

Throughout his whole course he stood well among his contemporaries. Hoping completely to regain health he on Oct. 26, 1924, went to Edmonton, Alberta, and for a time it seemed that he would be fully restored to his former health and vigor.
