In the last fifty years an appalling change has taken place in the status of the sacrament of matrimony. America at the present time has the worst record in the world, worse even than that of pagan Japan, for permanent marital unions.

Fifty years ago the first serious attacks upon the permanence of the marriage bond began in the United States. At that time one out of every eighteen marriages ended in divorce.

Presbytery In Session The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in regular session on Tuesday, March 7th, in St. James Church Hall, Charlottetown, and was opened in due form.

Diphtheria Clinics In City Schools The Department of Public Health is again actively engaged in bringing protection to the school and pre-school population of Charlottetown by immunizing the children against diphtheria with three inoculations of toxoid.

There were two sessions, morning and afternoon. The attendance was quite large, those present being: Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, Moderator; Rev. W. O. Rhoad, clerk; Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, D.D.; Rev. G. C. Webster; Rev. T. O. Hughes; Rev. J. C. McNeill; Rev. W. S. Wadland; Rev. Wm. Verwolf; Rev. A. S. McLean, and Messrs. M. J. Stewart, A. E. Morrison, Chas. McDuff, Alex. McKenzie, Oswald Graham, Chas. E. Stewart, James Marchbanks and Percy McPherson, elders; Rev. Wm. Townsend, D.D., and Rev. Mr. Mabon were present and were asked to sign and correspond.

Considerable correspondence was dealt with. A number of reports were submitted to the court and disposed of. Among these were the report on vacant congregations, the home mission report and the report on Sunday Schools and young people's work.

Rev. W. O. Rhoad reported for the Malpeque and Tryon congregations; Rev. R. Hensley Stavert for Murray Harbor North and Peters Road; Rev. G. C. Webster for Canoe Cove and Clyde River; Rev. Wm. Verwolf for the congregations of Alberton and Tyne Valley, and for the mission field of West Point.

These interim moderators are taking good care of the work in the home mission report and the report on Sunday Schools and young people's work.

The report on Sunday Schools and young people's work was presented by Rev. W. S. Wadland. The work in both the Sunday School and young people's societies has made good headway during the year. Quite a number from among the Sunday School scholars and the members of the young people's societies were reported as full members of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in the past twelve months.

The givings to missions by both the church and the young people's organizations were quite generous. Rev. W. L. Shaw, who was unable to be present, the report on statistics and finance was held over until the May meeting of the presbytery.

Mr. James McKay, D.D., London, Ontario, was nominated as a candidate for the moderatorship of the coming general assembly.

The advantages of the Sustentation Fund as compared with those of the Augmentation Fund were discussed briefly. A fuller discussion will be held at the next meeting.

The matter of the better observance of the Sabbath Day was brought before the court. It was agreed to adopt the suggestion of the Prince Edward Island Ministerial Association.

After the meeting of the Moderator and clerk of which public intimation was given, the benediction was closed by the Moderator, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert.

Seek Revision Of Motor Truck Rates On Ferry Rates on motor trucks carried between this Province and the United States were discussed at a special meeting of the Council of the local Board of Trade yesterday afternoon. The question was introduced by President C. N. Bissett who read a letter from Mr. J. O. Hyndman. By request Mr. Hyndman tabled a resolution he prepared. It would come before the board for further consideration at a later date. It was decided, it was understood the move was to have the rate on motor trucks crossing on the ferry reduced to a basis relative to the number of automobiles displaced by a truck.

The fire prevention committee, headed by Mr. J. M. Murley was instructed to cooperate with the Provincial Fire Marshal and the City Council in an endeavour to eliminate local fire hazards. The question was introduced by Mr. Murley who referred to the recent Queen Hotel disaster in Halifax.

Tentative plans were made to have the Passenger Traffic Managers of both Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways address a joint meeting of the Senior and Junior Boards of Trade next Monday night. The meeting would be held in the Board Room of the City Building. It was announced.

The Passenger Managers were expected to arrive in the City Tuesday evening and would discuss traffic problems with the local Travel Bureau.

Passenger service on local railway lines and the type of cars provided was referred to by President Bissett and the matter left to the time table committee to deal with.

A letter was read from Dr. J. A. Clark, Superintendent of the Charlottetown Experimental Station telling of a meeting to be held at the Farm on Tuesday afternoon next at 2 o'clock. The meeting would consider crop rotation and all interested were invited to attend.

The New York Chamber of Commerce extended cordial welcome to the members of the local Board of Trade who were in the city on their business trip.

MR. HANFORD A. BELL The village of Murray Harbor and surrounding districts were shocked and saddened on Feb. 28 when it became known that Hanford A. Bell, noted blacksmith and highly respected citizen of that place, had passed away at the age of 54 years.

Bell, with whom he learned the trade of blacksmithing. He had always been in excellent health, until six weeks previous to his death when he became stricken with a severe heart attack and upon the advice of his physician he was ordered not to work, but he was able to go to his forge daily to instruct his two sons who were associated with him, until on the above date he was stricken with another attack which resulted in his death.

The deceased was of a jovial, cheerful disposition which won for him many friends. Even in his greatest suffering he greeted his loved ones with a smile and a word of cheer. He possessed that kindness and generosity of his kind which made his home a home for all. It could well be said "his friends were many, his enemies few."

He leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving husband and father, his grief-stricken wife, nee Minnie White, three sons and two daughters: Roy, Aubrey, Hollis, Helen and Joyce. A son Bruce passed away two years ago upon entrance to the P. E. Island Hospital, a shock from which the late Mr. Bell never recovered; also two sons, Maurice and Orrin, passed away in infancy.

He also leaves a little grandson, Leigh Bell; also six brothers and two sisters. A brother and sister passed away very suddenly some years ago.

His passing leaves a void in the community which will be hard to fill, but it is in the home where he will be the most sorely missed. Here his loving wife and daughters will long for daily to instruct their sons who will long for his advice so freely given, but all in vain; that loving voice is stilled forever, but he has left a memory that shall always remain fresh in the hearts of those who loved him.
