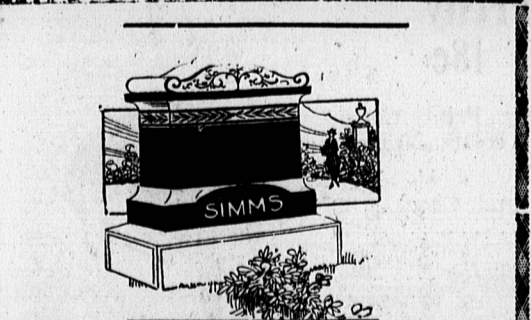

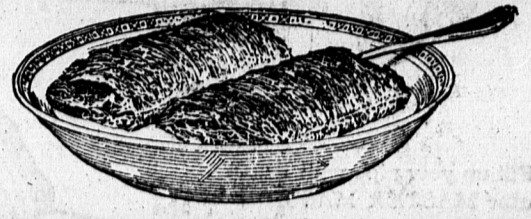

THEY LIKE CROSS FOX

Winnipeg, Aug. 24. — Marked increases of 126 per cent in crossbred fox featured the fur auction here the highest sale being recorded at \$70 as compared with \$31 at the sale at the end of June. Beaver mink 30 per cent; lynx, \$9.50 to \$25, down 8 per cent. The range: Beaver \$12.75 to \$31.50, up 4 per cent; mink, \$5.75 to \$5.25 to \$11.50, up 4 per cent; rat, 65 cents to \$2.25, down 9 per cent; martin, \$16 to \$29, up 13 per cent; silver fox, \$34 to \$24, up 5 per cent; crossbred fox, \$3.50 to \$70, up 126 per cent; red fox, \$5.25 to \$25, up 30 per cent; otter, unchanged; fisher, \$36 to \$96, down 1 per cent; and red fox rose 30 per cent; skunk, \$1.30 to \$3, down 8 per cent; weasel, 4 cents to 62 cents, up 17 per cent; bears, \$40 to \$13; wolverine, \$13.75 to \$16; wolves, \$6 to \$15, timber wolves, \$10 to \$24, white fox, \$38 to \$42.50.

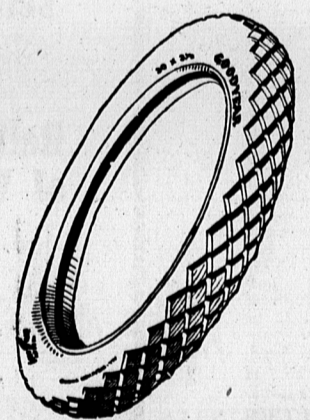

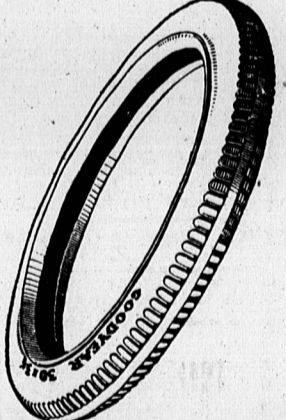

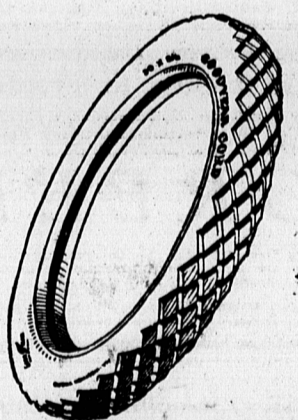
