TALK OF RUSH FOR TEDDY IN A FLORIDA CONVENTION.

COALGATE, Okla., Jan. 23.—Delegates to the fourth congressional district republican convention who arrived here today for this afternoon's meeting, were excitedly discussing rumors that the convention is to be swung to instruct for Theodore Roosevelt as republican presidential nominee. The report seemed heightened by the refusal of District chairman Edward Perry to deny it.

It has been reported late yesterday that Perry received letters from Col. Roosevelt and Postmaster-General Hitchcock, permitting use of the former president's name in the committee. Perry emphatically denied this, but he declined to comment on the convention's probable course of action this afternoon.
