THE Provincial Government was waited up yesterday by a deputation from the Prince Edward Island Lord's Day Alliance, re the charter granted during the last session of the Legislature to the Charlottetown Electric Power and Transit Co. The aim of the Alliance was to enlist the sympathies of the Government in the matter of amending this charter at first opportunity, so that the running of cars on Sunday be prohibited. Addresses were made to this end by Rev. Neil McLaughlin of Beedevue, Rev. R. G. Strathe of Summerside, Rev. S. J. Woodroffe and Rev. Wm. Dobson of Charlottetown, and Rev. A. D. McDonald of Hampton. Members of the Government expressed their sympathy with the representations of the deputation and now that the mists surrounding Sunday legislation are beginning to clear away it is expected that without doubt this charter will be amended during the next session of the Legislature, so as to prevent the running of Sunday cars. CANADA AND UNITED STATE

WASHINGTON, June 7.—Sir Mortimer Durand, the British ambassador, called upon Secretary Root at the state department today and discussed at some length the diplomatic questions opened between the two countries with special reference to the Canadian and Newfoundland fisheries. As a result of the ambassador's conference with the foreign office officials while he was in London recently, it will now be possible to make another move in the near future toward a settlement of this complex question. It will for instance, be attempted to clear the ground for final negotiations by seeking to reach agreements upon smaller but connected matters; while, as to others upon which there may develop disagreement essential facts, provision will be made for the ascertainment of these facts perhaps by joint investigations conducted by experts. Thus it is hoped that by next fall, when Secretary Root has returned from his southern voyage, the issues will be so clearly defined as to admit of final disposition in short order.

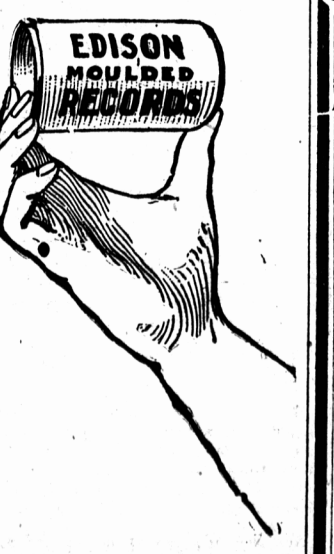
