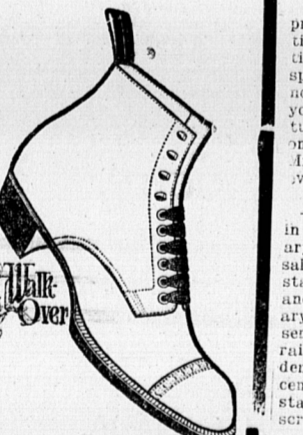

OBITUARY.

The death occurred at Springfield, Queen's Co., on Wednesday, July 8th, of John MacKenzie at the advanced age of 84 years.
