IN MEMORIAM

MR. THOMAS REID.

A good and true man passed away when the late Thomas Reid of Hope River went to his long rest on June 8th, and it is safe to say that for many years effective verminage that can be used. He bore his last sickness in a spirit of resignation that charmed and edified all those whose privilege it was to be admitted to his bedside. Whatever his sufferings, no complaint passed his lips, and even in moments of the most exquisite pain he never murmured, but met the attentions of those who waited on him with a patient smile or a whispered word of thankfulness. Thus with peace in his heart and prayer on his lips he trod the rocky road of suffering, comforted by the aid of the Holy Catholic Church and cheered by the unremitting care of his family and friends, till Friday evening, June 8th, he calmly passed away, his peaceful death being a fitting ending to his gentle and unobtrusive life. Neither doubt nor fear came to disturb his soul at that solemn moment, but calmly, as an infant, soothed to sleep, he passed from the cares of life to the possession of that peace "that surpasseth all understanding."

Besides his disconsolate widow, Teresa Leonard of Cornwall, to whom he was married on February 28th, 1876, he leaves to cherish his memory an adopted son and daughter, three brothers—Patrick and James, Hope River and Michael Vernon River and three sisters Mrs. John Harrington, California; Mrs. James Reid, Worcester, Mass; and Mrs. Keaveny, Charlottetown.

His funeral to St. Ann's Church, Hope River on Monday, June 11th, was attended by a very large concourse of people of all classes, and creeds, coming from all parts of the island to show by their presence their esteem and affection for the deceased. A solemn requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Albar Reid, nephew of the deceased, assisted by Rev. A. McAulay, St. Peter's, and Rev. J. J. McDonald, Kinkora, Rev. L. Herrick, Charlottetown and Rev. J. Poirie, St. Dunstan's assisting in the choir. Rev. J. J. McDonald sang a solo at the Offertory and he also preached the funeral oration, taking for his text "It is a holy and a wholesome thought to pray for the Dead, that they may be Loosed From their Sins." After Mass his remains were borne to the adjoining cemetery, the burial service being conducted by his former pastor and great friend, Rev. A. McAulay. The pallbearers were his six

nephews—Clarence, Leander, Wilbert Leo, Walter and Daniel Reid. Thomas Reid will long be missed in the community where he lived for so many years and where he exemplified the poets ideal "Act well your part, there all the honors lies."

SICK, BUT IGNORANT.

LONDON.—The German troops in the trenches are heartily sick of the war, but believe that the military caste must continue to rule the father land or the empire will collapse.

This, in effect represents the opinion of Major Morait, a noted military critic who according to Berlin despatch had just returned from the front and expressed his conclusions in the Duetche Tages Zeitung.

"We can only get rid of war," he writes, "if we learn from history the true lessons of this war, that is, if we develop the army which is the empire's strength. This is only possible on the tried foundation of our military foundation."

"In the view of our most intelligent leaders the great structure of our army will be extended. The army may be altered in spots but the structure must have no weak joints."

Every German soldier, he says, will be pleased at the end of this war, but he rejoices at present that there is no enemy on German soil and he demands that we must secure ourselves against such a surprise attack as was made by our enemies in 1914. Major Morait indicates that extension or extinction are the alternatives before Germany. While he pretends that the soldiers are hopeful of extension, there is an undercurrent of anxiety in his remonstrances against the liberal demands. This undercurrent tends to shed doubt upon his own assurance.

HUN DECLARES BRITISH BEATEN IN TWO MONTHS.

COPENHAGEN.—England is given less than two more months of life by Herr von Heydebrand, Conservative leader in the Reichstag.

In a speech to his electors he quoted a German admiral as saying: "We hope, yes, we are certain, that in two months at the most the condition of the English will be such that Great Britain will be finished."

Herr von Heydebrand had asked the admiral whether he believed Germany could win a complete victory through the submarine campaign. The admiral's confident reply was used by the Conservative leader to confound "doubters and lukewarm individuals" found among the German masses, who are questioning, in increasing degree, the political and military efficiency of ruthless submarine warfare.

Herr von Heydebrand also gave warning against hope of a separate peace with Russia and a consequent easy victory over Germany's other opponents. In this connection he said he himself formerly had cherished this hope, but that such a peace would be possibly only if made with a government strong enough to control the situation in the interior and face the consequences of a break between Russia and her Allies. The Russian government, he said, was not strong enough for this.
