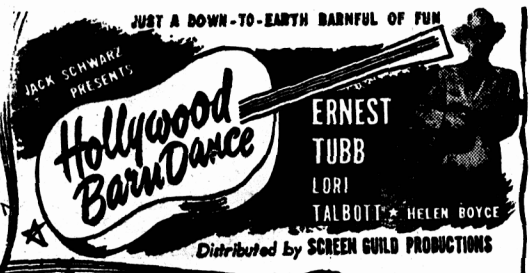

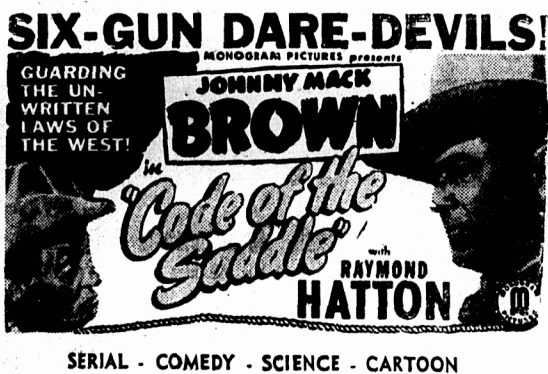

Besides his sorrowing wife he leaves to mourn three daughters and three sons, Irene, Mrs. Colin MacDonald of Commercial Cross, Lois, Mrs. Laurie MacLure of Murray Harbor North, Della, Mrs. Donald Gillis of Charlottetown and Austin, Harvey and Donald all of Lower Montague, also two sisters, Alice, Mrs. Alan Morrison of Peter's Rd., and Jenny, Mrs. L. S. Fairfield of Boston, Mass. Three sisters and two brothers predeceased him several years ago.

The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon from the United Church. The service, which was conducted by his minister, Rev. A. S. Adams, was very largely attended. The choir feebly sang "Rock of Ages," "Son of My Soul" and "Meet Me There." A solo "Good-Night and Good-Morning" was beautifully rendered by Howard Vickerson of Montague. It was Mr. Ross' wish that his sons, Austin, Donald and Harvey and sons-in-law, Colin MacDonald, Laurie MacLure and Donald Gillis be his pallbearers.

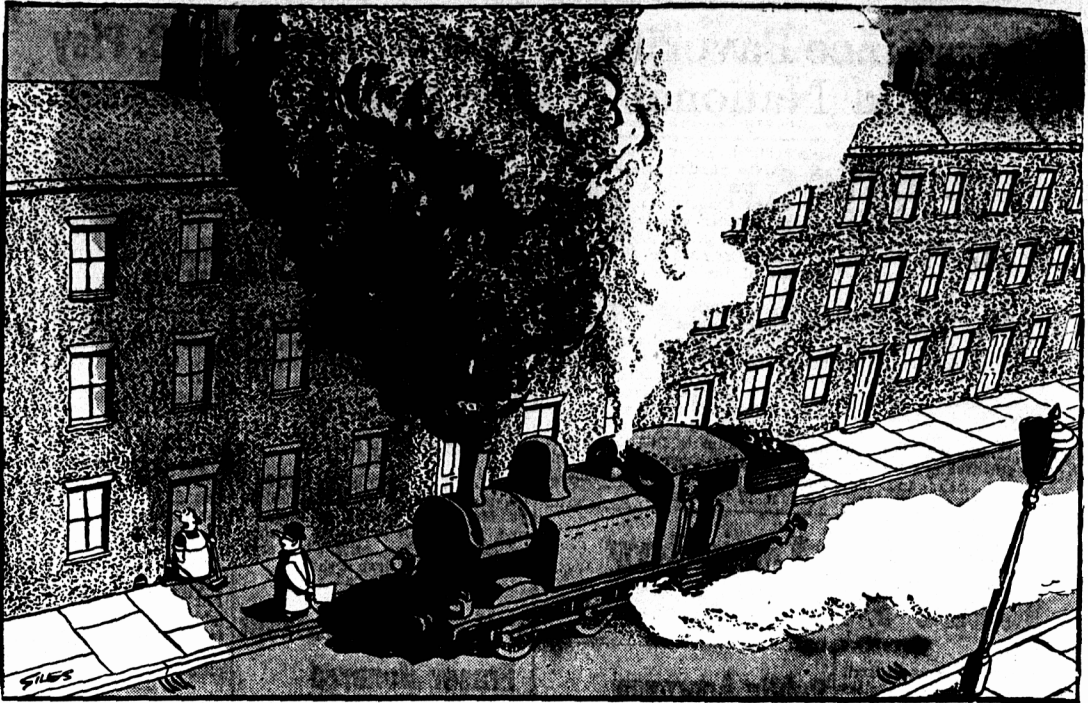

Dr. William James Deignan, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. William J.
